#### SHELBY COUNTY BOARD MEETING

#### July 9, 2014 - 9:00 A.M.

The Shelby County Board met on Wednesday, July 9, 2014, at 9:00 A.M. at the Courthouse in Shelbyville, Illinois.

Chairman Bruce Cannon called the meeting to order. Reverend Ronald Newman, retired minister from the Tower Hill Free Methodist Church, gave the prayer and all present recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

County Clerk Jessica Fox called the roll. Hayden was absent.

Minutes for the June 11, 2014 board meeting were presented for approval. Hunter made motion to approve the minutes as presented. Gergeni seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

Chairman Cannon presented the Fiscal Year 2013-2014 budget amendments stating that these amendments are for the budget we are currently in. The Budget Committee approved recommending the amendments for Airport, CEFS, Public Defender, Highway, Supt of Schools, Court Automation, GIS and Accounts Not Separately Budgeted. Cannon explained that most of these "expense" amendments had offsetting revenues, with the exception of a few. The Budget Committee felt that the Sheriff's office would finish the Fiscal Year 2013-2014 with money left in other areas of his budget so those amendments were not approved. (A detailed list of the amendments is attached to these minutes)

Amling made a motion to approve the FY 2013-2014 Budget amendments. Kearney seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

Next, Chairman Cannon presented the Fiscal Year 2014 – 2015 Proposed Budget totaling \$11,352,869.00. The proposed FY 14-15 Budget shows a deficit of \$38,988.00. Cannon explained the proposed budget deficit was approximately \$400,000 less than when the Budget Committee first started working on the Budget, and commended everyone for being able to decrease the projected deficit greatly. Discussion was held.

Warren made a motion to approve the Fiscal Year 2014-2015 Proposed Budget. Bennett seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Copy of FY 14-15 Proposed Budget worksheet attached to these minutes).

Jessica Fox, Election Authority, addressed the board regarding the Report of the Selection of Election Judges for the 2014 – 2016 terms. Every two years, the board approves the proper ratio of persons to serve as election judges in each election precinct from certified lists which have been furnished by the Chairman of the County Central Committees. (Lists submitted to board by central committee chairs attached to these minutes).

Hunter made motion to approve the persons to serve as election judges for the 2014 – 2016 two-year terms as presented. Amling seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

Animal Control Committee Chair Jordan addressed the Board to explain the Animal Control Services Contract that will be sent out to the municipalities once it is approved by the County Board. With increased expenses, the Committee feels it necessary that the municipalities begin paying for the animal control services provided to them by Shelby County. Information from other counties Animal Control services were researched and State's Attorney Vonderheide worked with the Animal Control Committee in drawing up these contracts. Animal Warden Brad Hudson addressed the Board to detail the options municipalities would have in regards to services and costs. These were recently explained to the municipalities during a community meeting held in June. Hudson also explained that municipalities are responsible for providing their own animal control services, and currently the only municipality paying for those services is Shelbyville. Hudson reported that of the counties in Illinois he has contacted, Shelby and Moultrie Counties were the only 2 counties not currently contracting with their municipalities to provide animal control services. Jordan and Hudson summed the contract up by saying it was essentially an inter-governmental agreement between the County and the municipality for animal control services.

Cruitt made a motion to approve the Animal Control Services Contract. Wetherell seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (19 yes, Lenz votes no). (Copy of Animal Control Services contract attached to these minutes).

At this time, Chairman Cannon called for the County Highway Engineer's report.

Alan Spesard, County Highway Engineer, presented an engineering agreement with Upchurch and Associates for the Cold Spring Township road upgrade project which will be 100% funded by Enbridge Pipeline. In conjunction with the engineering agreement, Spesard presented a Resolution for approval giving the road and bridge committee the authority to award the contract for the Cold Spring Township road upgrade project to the low bidder at the opening to be held at the Highway department on July 14<sup>th</sup>. Spesard reported that Enbridge Pipeline will be fully funding this project and the urgency is that this project needs to be completed by the end of the month.

Wetherell made motion to approve the Engineering agreement with Upchurch and Associates for the Cold Spring Township road upgrade project. Warner seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Copy of agreement attached to these minutes).

Amling made motion to approve the Resolution giving the road and bridge committee authority to award the Cold Spring Township road project to the low bidder when bids are opened on July 14<sup>th</sup>. Williams seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Copy of resolution attached to these minutes).

In continuing with department updates, Spesard reported that the letting for the Bridge replacement in Holland Township was held in Springfield on June 13<sup>th</sup>. There were 8 bidders for this project and IDOT awarded

the job to Schmitt Construction with a low bid of \$428,430.76. The estimated costs for this bridge replacement is \$424,777.00, this bridge replacement will be federally funded. The Findlay/Assumption intersection project has been completed and this intersection is now open. This is the first phase of a \$160,000.00 grant awarded to Shelby County by DCEO. The second phase will involve micro surfacing of some roads in the county and that phase will hopefully begin next month. A closed bridge in Holland Township will be replaced with a tank car, Spesard is hopeful that tank care will be installed and the bridge reopened before the end of July. The work on the closed bridge on the county highway south of Henton known as the Towbruff Bridge has been completed and this bridge has also been reopened.

Zoning Administrator/EMA/PCOM Jared Rowcliffe highlighted the Zoning/EMA/PCOM report previously mailed to the Board for their review.

Chairman Cannon called for committee reports. (Committee reports are attached to these minutes). Reports were given and items presented for follow-up or public awareness are as follows:

Legislative Committee Chair Amling reported the committee met to review closed meeting minutes. Since these minutes deal with litigation the committee recommended these minutes remain closed.

Law Enforcement Committee Chair Kearney stated the committee hadn't had a meeting recently, but did update the Board that the Jail had been inspected and given a good report.

Insurance Committee Chair Bennett reported that she currently had 2 companies reviewing the County's liability and workmen's compensation insurance to see if the County might get a better rate. Health insurance and life insurance for the employees are seeing a minimal increase.

Under Chairman Updates, Cannon reported that State Senator Chapin Rose would be in the area on July 16<sup>th</sup> meeting with all Shelby and Moultrie county emergency responders at 8:30 that morning in Shelbyville. Rose will be meeting with Highway Commissioners at the Findlay Village hall at 10:00 to discuss the capital bill, then plans to meet with area leaders from Moultrie and Shelby County in Sullivan at 11:30 to provide an update on Eagle Creek and will later meet with area school superintendents. Cannon urged those County Board members interested in attending to do so.

Chairman Cannon requested the following appointments:

Ken Fry, Greg Miller, Nancy Cruitt and Sandy Steinke, Shelby County Tourism Committee

Clark made motion to approve the Chairman's appointments. Wetherell seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

During public body comment, County Clerk Fox reminded County Board members to please notify her office of any committee meeting so a notice can be posted in accordance with the Open Meetings Act.

There was no further business to come before the Shelby County Board.

Clark made motion to assess mileage and per diem for the July meetings, to pay the bills/payroll as approved by the committees and adjourn until the next regular meeting to be held on August 13, 2014. Wetherell seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no) and the meeting was adjourned at 10:02 A.M.

# SHELBY COUNTY ANIMAL CONTROL REPORTING ANIMAL COMPLAINTS PROCEDURE

If you live in unincorporated Shelby County (not within a city/village limit), your call will be handled by Shelby County Animal Control. Report animal complaints by calling (217) 774-4932. If no one answers, please leave a message with your name, telephone number and the nature of the complaint. Your call will be answered in the order it was received unless the call is in regards to a vicious/dangerous dog as those calls take precedence over others. Dog bites take precedent over all other calls.

If you live within the city/village limits of a contracting municipality, contact local law enforcement. You must first report animal complaints to your municipal police, municipal official or local law enforcement. Your municipal police will either respond or request assistance from Shelby County Animal Control. See the Shelby County Animal Control Home page for a list of contracting municipalities.

If you live within the city/village of a municipality NOT contracting with Shelby County, your complaint call will be handled exclusively by municipal police, municipal official or local law enforcement. See the Shelby County Animal Control home page for a list of municipalities not contracting with Shelby County Animal Control. Shelby County Animal Control responds to dog bites in jurisdictions not contracting with Shelby County Animal Control.

## INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT RELATING TO ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES

This agreement is made and entered into this day of, 2014 by and between the County of Shelby, State of Illinois, (hereinafter referred to as Shelby County) and the CITY/VILLAGE/TOWN/MUNICIPALITY of, State of Illinois (hereinafter referred to as the Municipality).
WHEREAS, the Municipality is in need of an animal control program; and
WHEREAS, Shelby County operates the Shelby County Animal Control Facility for the County of Shelby; and
WHEREAS, Shelby County and the Municipality desire, pursuant to authority granted by Article VII, Section 10 of the Constitution of Illinois of 1970 and the Intergovernmental Cooperation Act, 5 ILCS220/1 et seq., to enter into an agreement for the joint exercise of their authorities and powers.

NOW, THEREFORE, upon mutual promises one to the other, Shelby County and the Municipality agree as follows:

SECTION 1 – Purpose of Agreement

Municipality is in need of a location to store stray, abandoned or seized dogs. SHELBY COUNTY has a location available for the stray, abandoned or seized dogs to be stored. The purpose of this AGREEMENT is the furnishing of a location for the municipality to store stray or seized dogs pending adoption or euthanization and Animal Control Services.

### SECTION 2 – Power and Authority

- a. The Municipality shall be responsible for all animal control enforcement within its borders if there is NO per capita contract in place. It shall be responsible for holding stray, abandoned or seized dogs for 48 hours and shall during that time period be required to attempt to locate and identify the owners thereof.
- b. The Municipality, after storage of the dogs for at least 48 hours, shall be responsible for transporting all dogs seized to the Shelby County Animal Control Facility which is seized by that Municipality.

If the Municipality cannot transport a fee of \$ 25, plus a \$20 boarding fee, will be billed to the Municipality.

- c. Shelby County shall accept full responsibility for all dogs that have been placed by a representative of the Municipality within a cage or enclosure within the Shelby County Animal Control Facility with the required and completed paper work.
- d. Shelby County shall attempt to find new homes for all dogs held at its facility for the Municipality. Shelby County shall hold dogs brought to its facility by the Municipality for a period of at least 7 days. Shelby County shall have the authority to euthanize any dog that remains within the facility after 7 days.
- d. If a per capita contract is in place, the Municipality shall designate a contact person who would call Shelby County Animal Control for assistance with stray, abandoned, or seized dogs. The representative shall be responsible for arranging transport and/or boarding for the dog with the Shelby County Animal Control.
- e. The contact person from the Municipality shall be responsible for filling out all the required paperwork concerning every stray, abandoned or seized dog. Shelby County is not required to accept responsibility for any dog which is brought to the shelter which is not accompanied by the required paperwork. The Municipality shall be required to remove andtransport from the shelter any dog that is placed in or brought to the shelter without the required paperwork.
- f. Shelby County shall not be responsible for locating the owner of any dog that has been placed at the shelter for storage. The Municipality shall be responsible for keeping a list of all dogs brought to the shelter by date, type and identifying markings and the sex of the animal. The Municipality shall be responsible for all inquiries relating to dogs seized by its representatives.

## SECTION 3 – Compensation and other Responsibilities

- a. The Municipality shall be responsible for compensating the County for boarding animals and/or animal control services.
- b. The Municipality shall have two options for payment, and shall inform Shelby County which option it chooses.
  - The Municipality shall pay to Shelby County a total sum equal to two dollars (\$2.00) per capita based on the Municipality's population, as represented in the 2010 Census of Shelby County (see attached). Statements will be sent at the end of the calendar year and are due on March 1, 2015 and each year thereafter unless the contract has been terminated.
  - 2. The Municipality shall pay a sum of \$ 100.00 per instance of animal control services used. Instance is defined as: any call received from the designated

reporting authority in which Animal Control responds by traveling to the location of the complaint. If the Municipality cannot transport the dog to Shelby County Facility, a \$25 transport fee will be charged plus \$ 20 boarding fee. Statements will be sent the end of the calendar year and are due on March 1, 2016 and each year thereafter unless the contract has been void.

- c. Animal Control does not take responsibility for wild animals, i.e., raccoons, opossums, squirrels, deer or any other non-domestic animal. Same fees listed above shall apply to cats.
- d. The Shelby County Animal Control Officer shall respond to calls regarding, and pick up animals running at large, within the town/village limits during regular operating hours of Monday through Friday from 8am to 3pm. Animal Control's response time will be a priority. Dog bite calls will have first priority. Shelby County Animal Control shall establish criteria for handling requests for service after regular operating hours.

#### SECTION 4 - Indemnification

The Municipality does hereby agree, as part of this Agreement, to indemnify, defend and hold harmless Shelby County and any employee, agent or officer thereof, for any liability, cost, expense, claim, demand, judgment or attorney fees arising from the personal injury to any of the county's employees while engaging in activities associated with this Agreement. The Municipality does also hereby agree, as part of this Agreement, to indemnify, defend and hold harmless Shelby County and any employee, agent or officer thereof for any liability, cost, expense, claim, demand, judgment or attorney fees arising from the injury, death or other disposition of any dog brought to the shelter that results from any action of the agents of the County regardless of negligence on the part of Shelby County.

## SECTION 5 – Effective Date of Agreement

This Agreement shall be in full effect and legally binding on the date of approval by both parties hereto.

## SECTION 6 – Termination of Agreement and /or Shelby County may terminate this Agreement at any time, at its option, by written notice given by the County Board Chairman or the Mayor to the other such termination, however, shall not relieve any party from any obligations or liabilities already accrued pursuant to the terms of this Agreement or of any payment to Shelby County for services rendered or to be rendered pursuant hereto after the termination of this Agreement. Traveling and other out-of-pocket expenses will be reimbursed to the ENGINEER at his actual cost. Subject to the approval of the LA, the ENGINEER may sublet all or part of the services provided under the paragraph 1b, 1c, 1d, 1e, 1f, 1h, 1j & 1k. If the ENGINEER sublets all or part of this work, the LA will pay the cost to the ENGINEER plus a five (5) percent service charge.

"Cost to Engineer" to be verified by furnishing the LA and the DEPARTMENT copies of invoices from the party doing the work. The classifications of the employees used in the work should be consistent with the employee classifications for the services performed. If the personnel of the firm, including the Principal Engineer, perform routine services that should normally be performed by lesser-salaried personnel, the wage rate billed for such services shall be commensurate with the work performed.

- 3. That payments due the ENGINEER for services rendered in accordance with this AGREEMENT will be made as soon as practicable after the services have been performed in accordance with the following schedule:
  - a. Upon completion of detailed plans, special provisions, proposals and estimate of cost being the work required by paragraphs 1a through 1g under THE ENGINEER AGREES - to the satisfaction of the LA and their approval by the DEPARTMENT, 90 percent of the total fee due under this AGREEMENT based on the approved estimate of cost.
  - b. Upon award of the contract for the improvement by the LA and its approval by the DEPARTMENT, 100 percent of the total fee due under the AGREEMENT based on the awarded contract cost, less any amounts paid under "a" above.

By Mutual agreement, partial payments, not to exceed 90 percent of the amount earned, may be made from time to time as the work progresses.

- 4. That, should the improvement be abandoned at any time after the ENGINEER has performed any part of the services provided for in paragraphs 1a, through 1h and prior to the completion of such services, the LA shall reimburse the ENGINEER for his actual costs plus \_\_\_\_\_\_ percent incurred up to the time he is notified in writing of such abandonment -"actual cost" being defined as in paragraph 2 of THE LA AGREES.
- 5. That, should the LA require changes in any of the detailed plans, specifications or estimates except for those required pursuant to paragraph 4 of THE ENGINEER AGREEs, after they have been approved by the DEPARTMENT, the LA will pay the ENGINEER for such changes on the basis of actual cost plus \_\_\_\_\_\_ percent to cover profit, overhead and readiness to serve -"actual cost" being defined as in paragraph 2 of THE LA AGREES. It is understood that "changes" as used in this paragraph shall in no way relieve the ENGINEER of his responsibility to prepare a complete and adequate set of plans and specifications.

#### It is Mutually Agreed,

- 1. That any difference between the ENGINEER and the LA concerning their interpretation of the provisions of this Agreement shall be referred to a committee of disinterested parties consisting of one member appointed by the ENGINEER, one member appointed by the LA and a third member appointed by the two other members for disposition and that the committee's decision shall be final.
- 2. This AGREEMENT may be terminated by the LA upon giving notice in writing to the ENGINEER at his last known post office address. Upon such termination, the ENGINEER shall cause to be delivered to the LA all surveys, permits, agreements, preliminary bridge design & hydraulic report, drawings, specifications, partial and completed estimates and data, if any from traffic studies and soil survey and subsurface investigations with the understanding that all such material becomes the property of the LA. The ENGINEER shall be paid for any services completed and any services partially completed in accordance with Section 4 of THE LA AGREES.
- 3. That if the contract for construction has not been awarded one year after the acceptance of the plans by the LA and their approval by the DEPARTMENT, the LA will pay the ENGINEER the balance of the engineering fee due to make 100 percent of the total fees due under this AGREEMENT, based on the estimate of cost as prepared by the ENGINEER and approved by the LA and the DEPARTMENT.
- 4. That the ENGINEER warrants that he/she has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the ENGINEER, to solicit or secure this contract, and that he/she has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the ENGINEER, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gifts or any other consideration, contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this contract. For Breach or violation of this warranty the LA shall have the right to annul this contract without liability.



A copy of our recent inspection report of your county jail is enclosed. The *Illinois Compiled Statutes* [730 ILCS 5/3-15-2(b)] mandates the Department of Corrections to inspect county jails annually and to make the results available for public review. Your offices should make this inspection report available in the records of Shelby County and you are encouraged to give notice to the citizens of your county, by news release or other means, that this inspection report is available for public review.

Two things stand out from this year's inspection. First and foremost, 4 of your correctional officers were awarded the Correctional Officer of the Year by the Illinois Sheriff's Association for their actions during a suicide attempt at your facility. Secondly, a report from the latest inspection of your facility from the Illinois Department of Labor shows no major noncompliance issues.

During a random cell check log examination of a date picked by Specialist Besson, all cell checks recorded by the security staff were well within the standards set by the Department of Corrections.

#### **INSPECTOR'S COMMENTS**

- 1. All employees are trained in CPR, First-Aid, and AED annually.
- 2. One booking cell and one padded room are not included in the jail's capacity.
- 3. Detainees notify staff when medical care is needed. A nurse is on call. The Shelby County Department of Public Health provides a nurse that visits once per week or more often if needed. The 14-day screenings and TB tests are given then. A local doctor is contracted to provide additional medical services. A local dentist is contracted to provide dental care. All security staff have been provided with the three shot series for Hepatitis B.
- 4. Meals are catered from the Farm House Restaurant. Food is transported and served in styrofoam containers. The restaurant is inspected annually by the health department. Officers serve pre-packaged items for breakfast.
- 5. Detainees use a debit time system for telephone service.
- 6. Visiting is conducted on Tuesday through Saturday. Visits are 20 minutes in length and can be scheduled between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.
- 7. Detainees in need of mental and/or substance abuse counseling are referred to the Shelby County Community Services. AA meetings are held at the jail upon request.
- 8. Razors are supplied daily.
- 9. The library is supplied with books donated by the Shelbyville Public Library.
- 10. Stellar provides weekly commisary.
- 11. The Shelbyville Fire Department tours the jail yearly. Simulated fire drills are conducted at that time.
- 12. The jail is a non-smoking facility.
- 13. Local clergy visit the jail on Tuesdays or as requested.
- 14. The county does not hold detainees for any other government or county law enforcement department.
- 15. The inspector spoke freely with numerous detainees who had no complaints.


