### SHELBY COUNTY BOARD MEETING

### November 12, 2015 - 9:00 A.M.

The Shelby County Board met on Thursday, November 12, 2015, at 9:00 A.M. at the Courthouse in Shelbyville, Illinois.

Chairman Cruitt called the meeting to order. Board member Dale Wetherell gave the prayer and all present recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

County Clerk Jessica Fox called the roll. Lenz was absent.

Probation Officer Heather Wooters requested the board proclaim December 2015 as Drunk and Drugged Driving (3D) Prevention Month. The Memorial Tree will be placed in the Courthouse throughout the month of December. Wooters thanked the Board for their support. (Proclamation attached to these minutes).

Wetherell made motion to approve the Proclamation declaring December 2015 to be Drunk and Drugged Driving (3D) Prevention Month. Bennett seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

Minutes for the October 14, 2015 Board meeting were presented for approval. Clark made motion to approve the minutes as presented. Mulholland seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

State's Attorney Gina Vonderheide requested approval for the annual State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor Resolution after noting highlights of the agreement.

Williams made motion to approve the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor Resolution as presented. Amling seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

Circuit Clerk Susan Arthur presented a Resolution for approval to fix juror compensation and jury trial demand fee. This fee will be paid by the attorney requesting the additional jurors and will aid in the payment of these jurors.

Mulholland made motion to approve the Resolution to fix juror compensation. Wetherell seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

Chairman Cruitt requested approval for a Resolution from WCDC to support WCDC in securing a FY 2016 Partnership Planning Assistance grant in the amount of \$50,000.00.

Barr made motion to support WCDC securing a \$50,000.00 Partnership Planning Assistance grant for FY 2016. Gergeni seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

Next, Chairman Cruitt presented for approval a Resolution accepting the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy for WCDC.

Clark made motion to approve the resolution accepting the WCDC CEDS. Mulholland seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

Chairman Cruitt presented the Resolution extending the Cable Franchise agreement with NewWave Communications that had been tabled at the October meeting. After reviewing information Clerk Fox had sent to the Board regarding this extension, Amling made motion to remove this agreement from the table. Strohl seconded the motion to remove the NewWave agreement from the table. All voted aye by voice (20 yes, 0 no).

Amling made motion to approve extending the Cable Franchise agreement with NewWave Communications. Strohl seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

At this time, Chairman Cruitt presented the Fraternal Order of Police Union Contract for both Unit A (Deputy Sheriffs) and Unit B (Dispatcher/Jailer, Jail Matron/Cook, Janitor, and Secretary/Bookkeeper) for approval. The contract is for 3 years and has been approved by the FOP union employees. Chairman Cruitt explained to the Board that negotiations between the County and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) had gone to mediation after 2 days for negotiations and that mediation was still ongoing.

Bennett made motion to approve the FOP contract as presented. Clark seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Presented changes attached to these minutes).

Insurance Chair Bennett informed the Board the Committee had met and reviewed the renewal for Liability Insurance for the County. The Committee felt it was in the County's best interest to stay with local provider Bliss McKnight through Shelbyville Insurance Services. Bennett informed the Board the premium will be \$190,054.00 which is down \$7,500.00 from the previous year. Bennett requested approval from the Board to keep the Liability Insurance with Bliss McKnight.

Williams made motion to keep Shelby County's Liability Insurance with current provider Bliss McKnight. Woodall seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

Chairman Cruitt presented the FY 2015-2016 Shelby County Tax Levy Resolutions for approval. (Original County Tax Levy Resolutions are attached to these minutes).

Wetherell made motion to approve the Tax Levy Resolutions for FY 2015-2016. Kearney seconded said motion, which passed by roll call vote (20 ayes, Lenz absent, Cruitt not voting).

### **Shelby County Board Meeting** November 12, 2015

At this time, Chairman Cruitt called for the County Highway Engineer's report.

Alan Spesard, County Highway Engineer, presented a Resolution for approval, along with some updates and highlights. The first item presented was a Resolution from the Shelbyville Township Highway Commissioner requesting that 2 miles of the Dick Campbell road be posted at 40 MPH, instead of the current 55 MPH. Following an engineering study Spesard agreed this portion of the road did need a speed reduction.

Williams made motion to approve the Resolution from Shelbyville Township to post a speed limit of 40 MPH on 2 miles of the Dick Campbell road. Durbin seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote, (20 yes, 0 no). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

The Semi-Annual Highway Commissioner's conference had a record attendance on November 6<sup>th</sup>. Items discussed were speed studies, mutual aid agreements, enhanced 9-1-1, ADA sidewalk inventory and transition plans. Tom Colclasure from SCCS updated those in attendance on the Cultivation Facility. Spesard stated he is currently meeting with the 24 Highway Commissioners throughout the County regarding their Motor Fuel Tax budgets. Since the state has no budget and MFT funds are being withheld, Spesard reported that projects would be deferred and contracts delayed as a result. The annual striping of roads within the County has been completed. 9-1-1 reference signs have begun being put up in the southwest corner of the county. Work continues to be delayed on the Richland Township bridges. 95% of the work has been completed, but weather has caused a delay in the completion of the dirt work.

Chairman Cruitt called for committee reports. (Committee reports are attached to these minutes). Reports were given and items presented for follow-up or for public awareness are as follows:

Airport Committee Chair Cannon reported that the recent Young Eagles fly-in was well attended.

Public Buildings Committee Chair Wetherell updated the Board that the sidewalks around the courthouse had been replaced. The committee did a final walk through of the County's bus barn, which is nearing completion.

There was no correspondence.

Chairman Cruitt requested approval from the Board to appoint Walter Lookofsky to the Airport and Landing Commission. Mulholland made motion to approve the appointment of Lookofsky to the Airport Commission. Wetherell seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote. (20 yes, 0 no).

Under Public Body comment, EMA Coordinator Rowcliffe gave an update on the Enhanced 9-1-1 and how the merger with Christian County was progressing. Rob Amling introduced Peace Corps Volunteer Jenny Biggs, who is helping in the Tourism office and assisting various MAPPING communities with various projects. Amling also mentioned there would be a reception for International Paper Plant Manager Bob Eades on November 16 at Shelbyville City Hall beginning at 1:00 PM. The Corps of Engineers is looking for Public input on their 10 year Master Plan and meetings will be held in Shelbyville on November 18<sup>th</sup> from 5:00 – 7:00 PM and Sullivan on November 17<sup>th</sup> at the same time. Cruitt mentioned that the Job Center and CEFS have merged offices in order to help with expenses and keep the Job Center in Shelbyville. The CEFS Food Pantry has been absorbed by the First United Methodist Church Food Pantry in Shelbyville. The Electronics recycling that normally takes place in January was also briefly discussed.

At this time, Cruitt requested the Board enter into closed session pursuant to statutory citation 5 ILCS 120/2C (2)-to discuss AFSCME Union negotiations.

Mulholland made motion to adjourn the regular meeting and convene to closed session. Bennett seconded said motion. Roll Call Vote: Aye: Amling, Barr, Behl, Bennett, Cannon, Clark, Durbin, Gergeni, Hayden, Hunter, Jordan, Kearney, Kessel, Mulholland, Simpson, Strohl, Warren, Wetherell, Williams, Woodall. Nay: None. Not Voting: Cruitt. Absent: Lenz. Motion carried.


### CLOSED SESSION OF THE COUNTY BOARD

### **PROCLAMATION**

### Drunk and Drugged Driving (3D) Prevention Month

**Whereas**, more violent deaths are attributed to traffic crashes than any other cause of death, and in 2013 there were 317 alcohol impaired fatalities in the State of Illinois, and

Whereas, approximately 2 out of every 3 Americans will be involved in an alcohol-related crash at some time in their lives; and

Whereas, the December holiday season is traditionally one of the most deadly times of the year for alcohol-impaired driving and is an appropriate time to focus attention on both the problems and the solutions; and

**Whereas**, for thousands of families across the nation, the December holidays are a sad time to remember loved ones they lost to an impaired driver during a previous holiday season; and

Whereas, community based programs involving consumer education, effective laws, and strong law enforcement have been proven successful in reducing impaired driving; and

Whereas, organizations from every state are joining together this December by supporting anti-impaired driving programs and policies; and

**Whereas,** Shelby County is a partner in that effort to make our roads and streets safer;

Now, therefore, I, David Cruitt, Shelby County Board Chairman, do hereby proclaim December 2015 as **Drunk and Drugged Driving (3D) Prevention Month** and do hereby call upon all citizens, government agencies, business leaders, hospitals, schools, and public and private institutions in Shelby County to promote awareness of the impaired driving problem, to support programs and policies to reduce the incidence of impaired driving, to promote safer and healthier behaviors regarding the use of alcohol and other drugs this December 2015 holiday season.



### **RESOLUTION**

2015-37

WHEREAS, the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor was created to provide services to State's Attorneys in Counties containing less than 3,000,000 inhabitants; and

WHEREAS, the powers and duties of the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor are defined and enumerated in the "State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor's Act, 725 ILCS 210/1 et seq., as amended; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois General Assembly appropriates monies for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Officer of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor, one-third from the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor's County Fund and two-thirds from the General Revenue Fund, provided that such funding receives approval and support from the respective Counties eligible to apply; and

WHEREAS, the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor shall administer the operation of the appellate offices so as to insure that all participating State's Attorneys continue to have final authority in preparation, filing, and arguing of all appellate briefs and any trial assistance; and

**WHEREAS**, the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor and the Illinois General Assembly have reviewed and approved a budget for Fiscal Year 2015, which funds will provide for the continued operation of the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Shelby County Board, in regular session, this <u>12th</u>day of <u>Nov</u>, 2015 does hereby support the continued operation of the appellate offices and process said appellate court cases for this County.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the attorneys employed by the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor are hereby authorized to act as Assistant State's Attorneys on behalf of the State's Attorney of this County in the appeal of all cases, when requested to do so by the State's Attorney, and with the advice and consent of the State's Attorney prepare, file, and argue appellate briefs for those cases; and also, as may be requested by the State's Attorney, to assist in the prosecution of cases under the Illinois Controlled Substances Act, the Cannabis Control Act, the Drug Asset Forfeiture Procedure Act and the Narcotics Profit Forfeiture Act. **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the attorneys employed by the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor may also assist the State's Attorney of this County in the discharge of the State's Attorney's duties in the prosecution and trial of other cases, and may act as Special Prosecutor if duly appointed to do so by a court having jurisdiction.



### **ARTICLE XVII VACATIONS**

### Section 17.1. Vacation Leave

All full time employees shall earn vacation time. Employees on leave of absence or layoff shall not accrue vacation time. Eligible employees shall earn vacation time in accordance with the following schedule:

<u>Unit B</u>	<u>Unit A</u>
After one (1) yearFive (5) working days	40 Hours
After two (2) yearsTen (10) working days	80 Hours
After ten (10) yearsFifteen (15) working days	120 Hours
After fifteen (15) yearsTwenty (20) working days	160 Hours

NOTE: Any employee with more than fifteen (15) years of service as of September 1, 2011 shall receive twenty (20) vacation days if in Unit B and 160 hours if in Unit A.

Vacation time shall be taken in not less than one half (1/2) day increments. Vacation days may not be accumulated from year to year. Employees shall be eligible for vacation time only after completion of one (1) year service. Thereafter, an employee's service date shall be the anniversary date of his/her hire.

Summary: Unit A was converted from days to hours because they work a 10 hour shift, no additional benefit was provided.

### Section 21.1. Pay Schedule

Retroactively effective on all hours paid and/or paid as if worked, to September 1, 2011, the attached wage matrices, referred to as "Deputy" and "Dispatcher/Jailer" Wage Appendices shall become effective. Existing employees shall be placed on the scale in the step equal to their years of service as of September 1, 2011 and shall move to the next step in the matrix on September 1<sup>st</sup> of each subsequent year and beyond unless otherwise mutually agreed to by the parties. Any employee in the classification of Jail Matron/Cook, Janitor and Secretary/Bookkeeper hired after the ratification of this agreement shall not be placed on the Dispatch/Jailer salary matrix, but rather shall be compensated at the starting rate of \$24,000. The base salary shall be increased by \$1000 on September 1<sup>st</sup> of each year of this Agreement (2015 through 2017).

Retroactive amounts and holiday compensation due employees under this agreement shall be paid, via separate check, to bargaining unit employees within thirty (30) days following ratification by the County.

Effective September 1, 2015, each step of the Deputy matrix shall be increased by \$1500 and each step of the Dispatcher/Jailer matrix shall be increased by \$1000.

Effective September 1, 2016, each step of the Deputy matrix shall be increased by \$1500 and each step of the Dispatcher/Jailer matrix shall be increased by \$1000.

Effective September 1, 2017, each step of the Deputy matrix shall be increased by \$1500 and each step of the Dispatcher/Jailer matrix shall be increased by \$1000.

Summary: a change of date reflecting the wage matrix.

### ARTICLE XXII INSURANCE AND PENSION

### Section 22.1. Insurance

The County agrees to pay full cost of the employee individual basic health insurance premium, except that each employee will contribute through payroll deduction an amount equal to \$40.00 per pay period for the term of this agreement. The Employer will bear the expense of any increase in costs during the term of the Agreement.

Summary: Increase FROM \$35.00 TO \$40.00 per month for a total insurance contribution by the employee in the amount of \$1,040.00 which amounts to approximately 12.5% of the employee's insurance obligation.







# Law Enforcement Committee Meeting Minuets 11-05-15

The November 5<sup>th</sup> 2015meeting of the Shelby County Law Enforcement Committee met at the Sheriff's Office with members present Kay Kearney, Richard Hayden and Bob Simpson. Sheriff Koonce called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Undersheriff McCall was present and served as Secretary.

Discussion was held between the members present about the terms of the FOP contract that was recently negotiated and settled. The full County Board will vote on the contract at the next meeting on 11-12-15. This also led to a brief discussion about the recently proposed UTV Ordinance that was to be discussed at the board meeting. It was reported by Ms. Kearney the proposal has been removed from the meeting's agenda until further research into the issue can take place.

Undersheriff McCall spoke on Intergovernmental Mutual Aid agreements between the Sheriff's Office and other Local Law Enforcement agency in the county. The most recent agreements were signed in 2008 when Sheriff Sims was still in Office. McCall reported the agreements will be updated as soon as possible.

McCall also spoke of the formation of a Major Crimes Task Force in Shelby County which will also run in conjunction with the Intergovernmental Mutual Aid agreements. However this agreement will specifically detail the Investigation of Major Crimes and the use of Local Law Enforcement Officers in the assistance of those crimes.

Sheriff Koonce, Undersheriff McCall and the two Corrections SGT's recently attended the Chief Deputy/Jail Administrators conference in Springfield. The training emphasized the importance of active command leadership.

Sheriff Koonce spoke briefly on the need for increased communications between office heads within the county.


