SHELBY COUNTY BOARD MEETING

May 10, 2017 - 9:00 A.M.

The Shelby County Board met on Wednesday, May 10, 2017, at 9:00 A.M. at the Courthouse in Shelbyville, Illinois.

Chairman David Cruitt called the meeting to order. Pastor Jay Huddleston of the Herrick Baptist Church gave the prayer and all present recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

County Clerk Jessica Fox called the roll. Amling and Woodall were absent.

Minutes for the April 12, 2017 board meeting were presented for approval. Mulholland made motion to approve the minutes. Gergeni seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (19 yes, 0 no).

Health Department Administrator Steve Melega addressed the Board to give an update on the status of the Health Department and the Health Status of Shelby County according to the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. Melega mentioned in the past Shelby County had been medically underserved but this has changed in recent years. The department continues to face challenges related to funding, changes with Medicaid funding and federal food code inspection mandates. Next year the Health Department will celebrate its 70th anniversary! Melega was thanked by the Board for the great job he does maintaining a fiscally responsible department.

At this time, Chairman Cruitt called for the County Highway Engineer's report.

Alan Spesard, County Highway Engineer, presented some department updates and highlights. The semi-annual highway commissioners' conference was held at the Highway Department on May 5th and was well attended. Spesard mentioned there are 9 new Highway Commissioners out of the 24 total within the county. Subjects discussed were safety and motor fuel tax, as well as some basic information. Representative Brad Halbrook was also in attendance. The railroad crossing in rural Township has been delayed due to the weather. The Henton Bridge on the County Highway will be closed this week in preparation for construction to begin. The bridges in the west half of Shelby County have been inspected. Bridges are required to be inspected once every 2 years. Cold Mix was produced at the Highway Department on May 8th and 9th. A bid letting was held for the bridge on the Dry Point/Lakewood Township line. Depew and Owen was the low bidder with a bid of \$456,688. Spesard will have more to report on this in the coming months. Questioned about recent flooding, Spesard reported very little damage had occurred in the County Highway system and he had gotten no phone calls regarding any issues caused by the flooding.

Chairman Cruitt called for committee reports. (Committee reports are attached to these minutes). Reports were given and items presented for follow-up are as follows:

Solid Waste committee member Larry Lenz reported the electronics recycling pickup held on April 15th was well attended and over \$2,000 in donations collected. Lenz thanked the groups that assisted with the pick-up.

Rescue Squad committee member Lynn Williams reported that with the recent floods the Rescue Squad had responded to 5 different calls and the Dive Team to 6 calls. Rescue Squad Chief Clint Stiner was in attendance and stated his department is staffed with volunteers and has equipment other fire protection districts can't afford. The only other FPD's with the necessary equipment are Moweaqua and Windsor and those departments serve as back- up for the Shelby County Rescue Squad.

Airport Committee member Bruce Cannon said the 10,900 gallon Jet A fuel tank has been installed and should be operational soon.


Chairman Cruitt requested the reappointment of Penny Standerfer, trustee to the Shelbyville Fire Protection district. Drnjevic made motion to approve the appointment. Wetherell seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (19 yes, 0 no).

Chairman Cruitt informed the Board he had received notification that Paul White, CEO of CEFS would be retiring on May 17th after more than 39 years with the organization. Kevin Bushur has been named as White's replacement.

During Public body comment, Findlay Village Board member Brooke Stevens addressed the board regarding flooding in the Village of Findlay. Stevens stated it was her understanding that the County was supposed to do a survey and clean the ditch from Findlay to the Bruce/Findlay road. Highway engineer Alan Spesard stated that indeed the survey had been done last summer. Spesard reported that cleaning the ditches would have very little effect on the flooding and what the Village needed was a storm sewer. Spesard stated he had spoken to Travis Park, utility superintendent about this. Chairman Cruitt recommended Ms. Stevens speak with Spesard and see if something could be done to help with the flooding problem until a more permanent solution could be done.

There was no further business to come before the Shelby County Board.

Metzger made motion to assess mileage and per diem for the May meetings, to pay the bills/payroll as approved by the committees and adjourn until the next regular meeting to be held on June 14, 2017. Cannon seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (19 yes, 0 nc) and the meeting was adjourned at 9:45A.M.







VISION AND HEARING SERVICES

A Certified Audio-Visual Screening Technician conducts the Vision and Hearing services. Most pre-school and school age children in Shelby County are evaluated through the program. The Audio-Visual Technician also makes referrals to appropriate agencies if a hearing impairment or visual problem is detected and provides follow-up to ensure treatment is received if needed. Free clinics are often sponsored by the Illinois Department of Public Health through the department.

Services provided by Vision and Hearing include:

- Vision and hearing screening in county schools
- Pre-school and nursery school vision and hearing screening

WOMEN, INFANT, AND CHILDREN (W.I.C.) PROGRAM

The Women, Infants, and Children (W.I.C.) is a USDA Federal Supplemental Food Program. This program provides vouchers (coupons) for specific nutritional foods and infant formula to Shelby County residents who are pregnant, breast-feeding, postpartum;

and to infants and children up to age five that meet income and program guidelines.





Chairman Rick Brown calls the meeting to order.

Jim Schwerman is present. Rick asks Jim to go ahead and give his presentation to the commission. Jim starts out saying he wanted to get everyone up to date on what's in store for the planting season this year. We will have corn south of the highway and the rest of the farm will be in soy beans. The field that's going to hay didn't get a very good stand last year and is scheduled to be redone. The seed company is going to help out some and sell the alfalfa at half price. The grass we'll have to buy again. Vicky Schafer has been hired to get that done. The ground is ready and Jim hopes she gets here pretty soon so it's done before the 15th. After that date you have less chance of being successful. Jim said he sold about 40% of the bean crop for 2017 at near \$10. Also sold about 25% of the of the expected corn production at \$3.73 a bushel. Some discussion followed about the grass crop and how it might turn out. Jim then excused himself.

Hangars are 90 % empty now and offered to store rest of stuff and shelving units in office area until they could come down and haul it away. Rick mentions talking to Jared Rowcliff about it, that he might be able to help.




