SHELBY COUNTY BOARD MEETING September 13, 2017 – 9:00 A.M.

The Shelby County Board met on Wednesday, September 13, 2017, at $9:00\,AM$, at the Courthouse in Shelbyville, Illinois.

Chairman David Cruitt called the meeting to order. Board member Joe Woodall gave the prayer and all present recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

County Clerk Jessica Fox called the roll. Coffman, Jordan and Strohl were absent.

Minutes for the August 9, 2017 board meeting were presented for approval. Mulholland made motion to approve the minutes. Wetherell seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

Zoning Administrator Jared Rowcliffe requested a zoning amendment for property owned by Don and Barb Satterfield in Section 2 Shelbyville Township, 1 mile north of Rt. 16 on Lithia Road. The property is currently zoned Rural residential and will be changed to General Business so the Satterfields can open a short term lodging rental. Both the planning commission and zoning board of appeals had met and approved this change.

Bennett made motion to approve the zoning amendment. Williams seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

Rowcliffe also referenced his monthly report, informing the Board he had received notice of a State Award for 1,668,533 for CIPT for fiscal year 2017-2018.

Next, Chairman Cruitt presented the Fiscal Year 2017-2018 Budget totaling \$12,405,192. The FY 17-18 Budget has a total deficit of \$678,012 and a special fund deficit of \$522,596. Amiling made motion to approve the FY 2017-2018 Budget as presented. Hayden seconded said motion, which passed by roll call vote: Aye: Arthur, Amling, Barr, Behl, Bennett, Cannon, Drnjevic, Durbin, Gergeni, Hayden, Kearney, Lenz, Metzger, Mulholland, Simpson, Wetherell, Williams and Woodall. Nay: None. Not Voting: Cruitt. (FY 2017-2018 Budget Summary attached to these minutes).

At this time, Chairman Cruitt called for the County Highway Engineer's report.

Alan Spesard, County Highway Engineer, addressed the Board to present 3 petitions, 1 agreement and 1 resolution. Spesard presented a petition from the Penn Township Highway Commissioner to replace a rusted out drainage structure 10 miles east of Moweaqua. The estimated cost to replace this structure is \$6,000 with costs to be shared equally between the County and the Township.

Cannon made motion to approve the petition. Wetherell seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no). (Petition attached to these minutes).

The next petition presented was to replace an old bridge in Rose Township located 2 miles southeast of Tower Hill. This bridge will be replaced with 1 or 2 pipes and the estimated cost is \$13,000, which will be split between the Township and the County.

Woodall made motion to approve the petition for Rose Township. Mulholland seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no). (Petition attached to these minutes).

The final 50/50 petition was a request from the Windsor Township Highway Commissioner for replacement of a drainage structure located 3 miles northwest of Windsor. The estimated costs for this project are \$10,000. Gergeni made motion to approve the petition. Woodall seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no). (Petition attached to these minutes).

Spesard next presented an agreement between IDOT and Shelby County to replace a closed Bridge in Oconee Township. The bid letting for this project is expected to occur in November. Estimated costs are \$500,000 and will be funded 80% federal, 16% state, with the remaining 4% to be shared by the County and the Township.

Amling made motion to approve the agreement. Simpson seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no). (Agreement attached to these minutes).

The final item submitted for approval was a Resolution deleting the County Highway #11 extension in the Village of Cowden from Rt. 128 to 45 feet west of 5th Street. This will clear up the designation of this road from the County Highway system. Wetherell made motion to approve the Resolution. Arthur seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (17 yes, 1 no Barr). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

Continuing with updates, Spesard reported the Wood Street Bridge in Shelbyville was opened on August 24th and has received the final inspection from IDOT. The Henton Bridge on the County Highway west of Henton was opened Monday September 11 and the IDOT inspection will follow. There are currently no posted bridges in the County Highway System in Shelby County. Spesard reported this has never happened, as far as he knew; clear back to when they first started posting bridges. Spesard remarked he is "very proud" of this and it "only took me 18 years to accomplish it." IDOT had requested a couple of bridges in the township bridge system be posted, 1 in Windsor Township and 1 on the Ash Grove/Big Spring township line. The bridge on the Dry Point/Lakewood line is coming along and should be opened soon. The closed bridge in Prairie Township reported on last month has been reevaluated and is now open and posted at 5 ton. Applications for grants for the major bridge program are due next week. Spesard stated he will apply again to replace a bridge south of Westervelt. Spesard applied for a grant last year to replace the same bridge; however the program was not funded. Completing his report, Spesard announced he had applied for a Federal Land Access Improvement grant to improve county highway 5, also known as Country Club road. The total cost for this project is expected to be 2.7 million and the maximum Spesard could apply for was 2 million. Spesard received notification the County has been award 1.632 million dollars in grant funds for this project, which is the largest grant he can remember the County being awarded.

Chairman Cruitt called for committee reports. (Committee reports are attached to these minutes). Reports were given and items presented for follow-up or for public awareness are as follows:

<u>Shelby County Board Meeting</u> September 13, 2017

Airport Committee member Cannon – a special meeting was held recently to approve a \$150,000 short term note to finalize payment for the jet fuel project. Plans are currently under way for the Balloon Fest to be held October 6-8.

Public Buildings Chair Wetherell – the committee is continuing to work on the roof project and trying to figure out a way to pay for the roof repair. Plans are to sandblast the decorative metal on the roof and to find a painter who could get it painted at the same time.

Chairman Cruitt then requested the appointments of the following:

Eric Tucker, Cowden Fire Protection District Trustee. Motion by Bennett, second by Wetherell; all voted aye by voice (18 yes, 0 no).

Kevin Kersey, Cowden Fire Protection District Trustee. Motion by Bennett, second by Woodall; all voted aye by voice (18 yes, 0 no).

John Warren, Big Spring/Prairie Drainage Commissioner. Motion by Wetherell, second by Arthur; all voted aye by voice (18 yes, 0 no).

Nancy Handegan, Drainage Commissioner for Combined Drainage District #2 Town of Tower Hill. Motion by Woodall, second by Metzger; all voted age by voice (18 yes, 0 no).

Kent Kuhle, Drainage Commissioner for Union Drainage District #1 Townships of Flat Branch and Assumption. Motion by Cannon, second by Bennett; all voted aye by voice (18 yes, 0 no).

Julie Elbert, Drainage Commissioner Combined Clarksburg & Shelbyville Townships Drainage District #1 Townships of Clarksburg & Shelbyville. Motion by Mulholland, second by Durbin; all voted age by voice (18 yes, 0 no).

Michael Dove, Drainage Commissioner Combined Clarksburg & Shelbyville Townships Drainage District #1 Townships of Clarksburg & Shelbyville. Motion by Wetherell, second by Mulholland; all voted aye by voice (18 yes, 0 no).

There was no correspondence, no public body comment and no further business to come before the county board.

Metzger made motion to assess mileage and per diem for the September meetings, to pay the bills/payroll as approved by the committees and adjourn until the next regular meeting to be held on October 11, 2017. Strohl seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no) and the meeting was adjourned at 9:32 A.M.







Agreement Provisions

THE LPA AGREES:

- To acquire in its name, or in the name of the STATE if on the STATE highway system, all right-of-way necessary for this project in accordance with the requirements of Titles II and III of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, and established State policies and procedures. Prior to advertising for bids, the LPA shall certify to the STATE that all requirements of Titles II and III of said Uniform Act have been satisfied. The disposition of encroachments, if any, will be cooperatively determined by representatives of the LPA, and the STATE and the FHWA, if required.
- (2) To provide for all utility adjustments, and to regulate the use of the right-of-way of this improvement by utilities, public and private, in accordance with the current Utility Accommodation Policy for Local Agency Highway and Street Systems.
- (3) To provide for surveys and the preparation of plans for the proposed improvement and engineering supervision during construction of the proposed improvement.
- (4) To retain jurisdiction of the completed improvement unless specified otherwise by addendum (addendum should be accompanied by a location map). If the improvement location is currently under road district jurisdiction, an addendum is required.
- (5) To maintain or cause to be maintained, in a manner satisfactory to the **STATE** and the **FHWA**, the completed improvement, or that portion of the completed improvement within its jurisdiction as established by addendum referred to in item 4 above.
- (6) To comply with all applicable Executive Orders and Federal Highway Acts pursuant to the Equal Employment Opportunity and Nondiscrimination Regulations required by the U.S. Department of Transportation.
- To maintain, for a minimum of 3 years after final project close-out by the STATE, adequate books, records and supporting documents to verify the amounts, recipients and uses of all disbursements of funds passing in conjunction with the contract; the contract and all books, records and supporting documents related to the contract shall be available for review and audit by the Auditor General and the department; and the LPA agrees to cooperate fully with any audit conducted by the Auditor General and the STATE; and to provide full access to all relevant materials. Failure to maintain the books, records and supporting documents required by this section shall establish a presumption in favor of the STATE for the recovery of any funds paid by the STATE under the contract for which adequate books, records and supporting documentation are not available to support their purported disbursement.
- (8) To provide if required, for the improvement of any railroad-highway grade crossing and rail crossing protection within the limits of the proposed improvement.
- (9) To comply with Federal requirements or possibly lose (partial or total) Federal participation as determined by the FHWA.
- (10) (State Contracts Only) That the method of payment designated on page one will be as follows:
 - Method A Lump Sum Payment. Upon award of the contract for this improvement, the LPA will pay to the STATE within thirty (30) calendar days of billing, in lump sum, an amount equal to 80% of the LPA's estimated obligation incurred under this Agreement. The LPA will pay to the STATE the remainder of the LPA's obligation (including any nonparticipating costs) within thirty (30) calendar days of billing in a lump sum, upon completion of the project based on final costs.
 - Method B Mcnthly Payments. Upon award of the contract for this improvement, the LPA will pay to the STATE, a specified amount each month for an estimated period of months, or until 80% of the LPA's estimated obligation under the provisions of the Agreement has been paid, and will pay to the STATE the remainder of the LPA's obligation (including any nonparticipating costs) in a lump sum, upon completion of the project based upon final costs.
 - Method C Progress Payments. Upon receipt of the contractor's first and subsequent progressive bills for this improvement, the LPA will pay to the STATE within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt, an amount equal to the LPA's share of the construction cost divided by the estimated total cost, multiplied by the actual payment (appropriately adjusted for nonparticipating costs) made to the contractor until the entire obligation incurred under this Agreement has been paid.

Failure to remit the payment(s) in a timely manner as required under Methods A, B, or C, shall allow the **STATE** to internally offset, reduce, or deduct the arrearage from any payment or reimbursement due or about to become due and payable from the **STATE** to **LPA** on this or any other contract. The **STATE**, at its sole option, upon notice to the **LPA**, may place the debt into the Illinois Comptroller's Offset System (15 ILCS 405/10.05) or take such other and further action as my be required to recover the debt.

- (11) (Local Contracts or Day Labor) To provide or cause to be provided all of the initial funding, equipment, labor, material and services necessary to construct the complete project.
- (12) (Preliminary Engineering) In the event that right-of-way acquisition for, or actual construction of, the project for which this preliminary engineering is undertaken with Federal participation is not started by the close of the tenth fiscal year following the fiscal year in which the project is federally authorized, the LPA will repay the STATE any Federal funds received under the terms of this Agreement.
- (13) (Right-of-Way Acquisition) In the event that the actual construction of the project on this right-of-way is not undertaken by the close of the twentieth fiscal year following the fiscal year in which the project is federally authorized, the LPA will repay the STATE any Federal Funds received under the terms of this Agreement.

Highway Commissioner Oconee Road District (14) • (Railroad ed Work Only) The estimates and general layout plans for at-grade crossing improvements she forwarded to the Rail Saledy and Project Engineer, Room 204, Illinois Department of Transportation, 2300 South Dirksen Pally, Springfield, Illinois, 62764. Approval of the estimates and general layout plans should be obtained prior to the commencement of railroad related work. All railroad related work is also subject to approval be the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC). Final inspection for railroad related work should be coordinated through appropriate IDOT District Bureau of Local Roads and Streets office.

Plans and preemption times for signal related work that will be interconnected with traffic signals shall be submitted to the ICC for review and approval prior to the commencement of work. Signal related work involving interconnects with state maintained traffic signals should also be coordinated with the IDOT's District Bureau of Operations.

The LPA is responsible for the payment of the railroad related expenses in accordance with the LPA/railroad agreement prior to requesting reimbursement from IDOT. Requests for reimbursement should be sent to the appropriate IDOT District Bureau of Local Roads and Streets office.

Engineer's Payment Estimates shall be in accordance with the Division of Cost on page one.

- (15) And certifies to the best of its knowledge and belief its officials:
 - (a) are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency;
 - (b) have not within a three-year period preceding this Agreement been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (Federal, State or local) transaction or contract under a public transaction; violation of Federal or State antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements receiving stolen property;

 - (a) No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the undersigned, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress or any employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement;
 - (b) If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress or an employee of a Member of Congress, in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying", in accordance with its instructions;
 - (c) The LPA shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subawards at all ties (including subcontracts, subgrants and contracts under grants, loans and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.
- (19) To regulate parking and traffic in accordance with the approved project report.
- (20) To regulate encroachments on public right-of-way in accordance with current Illinois Compiled Statutes.
- (21) To regulate the discharge of sanitary sewage into any storm water drainage system constructed with this improvement in accordance with current Illinois Compiled Statutes.
- To complete this phase of the project within three (3) years from the date this agreement is approved by the **STATE** if this portion of the project described in the Project Description does not exceed \$1,000,000 (five years if the project costs exceed \$1,000,000).
- (23) To comply with the federal Financial Integrity Review and Evaluation (FIRE) program, which requires States and subrecipients to justify continued federal funding on inactive projects. 23 CFR 630.106(a)(5) defines an inactive project as a project which no expenditures have been charged against Federal funds for the past twelve (12) months.
 - To keep projects active, invoicing must occur a minimum of one time within any given twelve (12) month period. However, to ensure adequate processing time, the first invoice shall be submitted to the **STATE** within six (6) months of the federal authorization date. Subsequent invoices will be submitted in intervals not to exceed six (6) months.
- The LPA will submit supporting documentation with each request for reimbursement from the STATE. Supporting documentation is defined as verification of payment, certified time sheets or summaries, vendor invoices, vendor receipts, cost plus fix fee invoice, progress report, and personnel and direct cost summaries.and other documentation supporting the requested reimbursement amount (Form BLRS 05621 should be used for consultant invoicing purposes). LPA invoice requests to the STATE will be submitted with sequential invoice numbers by project.

- The LPA bmit to the STATE a complete and detailed final invoice with applicable supporting documents of all incurred costs, less previous payments, no later than twelve (12) months from the date of completion of this phase of the provement or from the date of the previous invoice, which ever occurs first. If a final invoice is not received within this time frame, the most recent invoice may be considered the final invoice and the obligation of the funds closed.
- (25) The LPA shall provide the final report to the appropriate STATE district within twelve months of the physical completion date of the project so that the report may be audited and approved for payment. If the deadline cannot be met, a written explanation must be provided to the district prior to the end of the twelve months documenting the reason and the new anticipated date of completion. If the extended deadline is not met, this process must be repeated until the project is closed. Failure to follow this process may result in the immediate close-out of the project and loss of further funding.
- (26) (Single Audit Requirements) That if the **LPA** expends \$750,000 or more a year in federal financial assistance they shall have an audit made in accordance with 2 CFR 200. **LPA**s expending less than \$750,000 a year shall be exempt from compliance. A copy of the audit report must be submitted to the **STATE** (Office of Finance and Administration, Audit Coordination Section, 2300 South Dirksen Parkway, Springfield, Illinois, 62764), within 30 days after the completion of the audit, but no later than one year after the end of the **LPA**'s fiscal year. The CFDA number for all highway planning and construction activities is 20.205.

Federal funds utilized for constructon activities on projects let and awarded by the STATE (denoted by an "X" in the State Contract field at the top of page 1) are not included in a LPA's calculation of federal funds expended by the LPA for Single Audit purposes.

(27) That the **LPA** is required to register with the System for Award Management or SAM (formerly Central Contractor Registration (CCR)), which is a web-enabled government-wide application that collects, validates, stores, and disseminates business information about the federal government's trading partners in support of the contract award and the electronic payment processes. To register or renew, please use the following website: https://www.sam.gov/portal/public/SAM/#1.

The **LPA** is also required to obtain a Dun & Bradstreet (D&B) D-U-N-S Number. This is a unique nine digit number required to identify subrecipients of federal funding. A D-U-N-S number can be obtained at the following website: http://fedgov.dnb.com/webform.

THE STATE AGREES:

- (1) To provide such guidance, assistance and supervision and to monitor and perform audits to the extent necessary to assure validity of the LPA's certification of compliance with Titles II and III requirements.
- (2) (State Contracts) To receive bids for the construction of the proposed improvement when the plans have been approved by the STATE (and FHWA, if required) and to award a contract for construction of the proposed improvement, after receipt of a satisfactory bid.
- (3) (Day Labor) To authorize the **LPA** to proceed with the construction of the improvement when Agreed Unit Prices are approved, and to reimburse the **LPA** for that portion of the cost payable from Federal and/or State funds based on the Agreed Unit Prices and Engineer's Payment Estimates in accordance with the Division of Cost on page one.
- (4) (Local Contracts) For agreements with Federal and/or State funds in engineering, right-of-way, utility work and/or construction work:

This perception of the Internet as a free and unrestricted platform is widely considered invalid by many western governments, who have already been placing limitations on Internet access and implementing laws that determine the legal and illegal dissemination of information online. The goal is largely to combat the flow of material such as pornography but also, with regard to the distribution of classified government data, prevention of unlicensed online gambling on the web, protection of intellectual property rights and more.

While the notion of a free and unimpeded Internet is a noble and commendable idea for individuals to support, organizations have much wider implications to consider when providing users with access to the internet at the workplace. Organizations are liable for the activities of their employees, both online and offline, and thus have a duty of care to ensure that employees are not exposed, intentionally or otherwise, to material that could offend or be interpreted as offensive or which could leave the company open to prosecution or claims for compensation.

Indeed, for an organization, the taboos of restricting access to certain quarters of the web are far outweighed by the need to deliver a safe, inoffensive and culturally sensitive working environment.

Furthermore, early consumer web filtering applications — which were a very different and cruder form of technology from the enterprise applications we use today — often relied on keywords, rather than detailed and well-maintained lists of good and bad sites , in order to determine what should and should not be blocked, often with unfortunate results. Over-zealous and poorly-maintained implementations would see otherwise harmless sites, including national newspapers and broadcast news sites, being blocked along with popular web-based email services such as Hotmail, not on the basis of productivity or bandwidth concerns, but merely because these under-developed applications generated false-positives, mistaking perfectly legitimate sites as ones potentially containing offensive content .

Today, web filtering technology has moved far beyond these early pre-conceptions of technology, and deliver a compelling argument in favor of allowing companies to control how, when and what corporate Internet connections are used for ensuring that web access at the workplace is for the benefit of the organization and its employees

BENEFITS AND IMPORTANCE OF FILTERING AND MONITORING

Benefits and importance of filtering and monitoring

Today, web filtering technology has moved far beyond these early pre-conceptions of technology, and deliver a compelling argument in favor of allowing companies to control how, when and what corporate Internet connections are used for ensuring that web access at the workplace is for the benefit of the organization and its employees

- Productivity Web filtering can allow an organization to address excessive use of non-work websites by either preventing or limiting access to services such as social networking, online auctions, online gambling, personal web-based email, celebrity gossip, torrents, file download sites and so on. This can be done in numerous ways, ranging from a total blockage of access requests, down to allowing specific users and work groups, or simply allowing access at certain times such as lunch time or before and after normal working hours. The latter approaches can help companies balance the needs and morale of staff while at the same time ensuring that day-to-day activity is not hindered by web-based distractions.
- Minimizing liability Companies must take all reasonable steps to protect themselves and their staff from liability. For example, website content that seems funny to some may be considered racially or sexually explicit, offensive or discriminatory by others. Case law in several countries has confirmed that the employer is responsible for the web activities of its staff, particularly when these activities involve illegal or offensive material. By implementing web filtering technology, not only can an organization prevent access to much of this content before it is accessed, but through associated web monitoring technology, it can also maintain accurate and detailed logs to show who attempted to access inappropriate content and when, allowing appropriate action to be taken as necessary and for evidence to be produced to support claims of inappropriate IT use at the workplace.
- Network and bandwidth management The changing nature of the way we use the web and the way content is expressed on websites is placing growing pressure on broadband connections both at home and at the workplace. Growth of video-on-demand sites such as YouTube, Netflix, Hulu and Amazon Instant Video has triggered a substantial increase in bandwidth consumption. This is in acdition to the increased use of video on everything from corporate websites to retailers to reference services. The result is that inoffensive casual browsing and even legitimate work-related browsing can place strain on both an Internet connection and the internal network. Web filtering and monitoring helps organizations understand the types of sites and content that is accessed at the workplace and at what time, helping with capacity planning and highlighting areas for further investigation in the case of casual browsing or upsurges in traffic around key events such as the Olympics, The World Series, major news events and other video-heavy content events.
- Data security Web filtering delivers an essential layer of protection from malware, phishing and other
 online scams long before client computers and end-users would be exposed to them. By blocking

access to known bad sites at source, end-users can be protected from straying into the path of malware and can avoid being duped by scams such as phishing attacks, while malware already present on devices can be limited in its ability to access the web to further infect a machine.

AN EFFECTIVE SOLUTION FOR WEB FILTERING

An effective solution for web filtering

Enterprise-grade web filtering solutions represent highly-developed and proven technologies for accurately blocking and allowing web access based on pre-determined lists of good and bad sites, as well as making to block or not to block use of user-provided data and feedback on legitimate and malicious sites. Combined with heuristic scanning, these tools deliver a layer of protection that can stop security threats before they even have a chance to connect and load.

A robust solution will allow organizations to maintain highly detailed control over web access centrally, set and enforce policies on Internet usage, as well as provide a high level of web-based security – blocking malicious content before it reaches the user's machine.

Administrators should be able to see in real time what sites are being browsed and what files are being downloaded. An active connection, browsing session or download should easily be blocked, simply by clicking on a single 'block connection' button.

Filtering and access policies can be set based on user, work group and IP range, allowing highly granular control over who has access to what within the organization, while at the same time maintaining blanket rules over blocking and access limitations. Time and bandwidth-based web browsing policies can also be used to allow access at certain times, or for quotas to be allocated, particularly useful for allowing access to high-bandwidth sites such as YouTube, but capping exposure and maintaining a balance between bandwidth and free use of the organization's connection for work and non-work browsing.

SUMMARY

Summary

Today's web-based threats from malware and other malicious websites alone make a compelling case for implementing web filtering and content monitoring at the workplace. While technology delivers significant security benefits, it offers much more to the organization at large and to the IT department in the form of providing a centralized way to monitor, analyze and limit Internet use as needed.

Client-based security solutions such as firewalls and antivirus solutions, regardless of how good they are, should not be expected to provide total and unwavering protection from threats. Rather, these should be paired with robust server-side web filtering solutions to deliver an array of proven counter measures that can tackle Internet-based threats at all stages, not just locally on the client. Coupled with centralized management and control of both whitelists and blacklists, organizations can ensure that problematic or high-bandwidth sites are blocked, limited or monitored, as needed, to ensure the right balance between unencumbered Internet access and business productivity.

Web filtering plays a significant role in enabling what can and cannot be accessed. However, it is not about creating multi-tier access for gain or undermining net neutrality, but more about maintaining access integrity and ensuring security over needlessly limiting access to information.

In short, web filtering is no longer a taboo; it is an essential tool in the battle against IT security threats and an important resource for IT departments trying to maximize the performance and cost-effectiveness of networks and connectivity



Commissioner Rick Brown calls the meeting to order.

The minutes were read by all. Rick makes a motion to approve the minutes. It was seconded by Jeff and was approved by all saying aye.

The Treasurer's report was read by all. Walt makes a motion to approve the Treasurers Report. It was seconded by Jeff and approved by all saying aye.

Steve tells the Commission that he received an email from a Penelope from Syntech explaining that MasterCard was coming out with a new card called MasterCard 2 and our FMU was too old,(6 years), and would not accept the new card. All transactions made from the new card that are rejected would have a fine of \$2500 each for the first 30 days and every 30 days that go by the fine doubles. The date this goes in effect is June 30, 2017. Steve says our FMU needs to have seven boards replaced and about an hour with Syntech Hardware and Software support to get the new software downloaded and working. The cost to the airport would be \$3222.00. With the amount of MasterCard transactions we have had, and after a lengthy discussion, the commission decided to replace the boards and continue accepting MasterCard. Steve is going to ask Brian Brown if he could check with Arrow Energy about helping with the cost of the upgrade.

Managers Report

Scott mentioned that we received the Jet fuel and waiting on a ten day soak test to make sure there are no leaks. Scott also mentions Avgas sales have picked some because of the time of year.

Also the last time they hooked up the Jet fuel pump the FMU and board was fried and would not take credit cards or our Smart Cards. They over nighted a new board at their expense and it came in Saturday morning and he got it installed and reading cards again that afternoon. Still a lot of mowing going on.

We're having a EAA Young Eagles event on July 15th and that he had started putting out the signs and posters up. Had a new customer from NFI Foods in and they were surprised that we had Jet A fuel and also a nice courtesy van to use.

Sold one aircraft, the Kit Fox of Gherardini's. Still need to annual Rick's Arrow so it can go on the market and also Derek Pearcy's Arrow is up for sale and a Luscombe is on the market.

There was some more discussion on the Jet fuel and the FMU and Scott says it's pretty well the same, but you have to choose a pump now, 1 for 100LL or 2 for Jet A.

Scott mention that he also ask about a single point hookup for regular business jets and they said we could not do that with this system because we needed a "Dead Man Switch" to do that. Scott went on the explain what that is and some discussion followed about that and the hook up for the crop dusters.

Scott had the retail pricing for Jet A set at \$3.15 a gallon and that we still needed to come to an agreement with the crop dusters. A discussion on the matter followed.






