#### SHELBY COUNTY BOARD MEETING

#### October 14, 2021-7:00 P.M.

The Shelby County Board met on Thursday, October 14, 2021, at 7:00 P.M. in Courtroom A of the Shelby County Courthouse in Shelbyville, Illinois.

Chairman Bryon Coffman called the meeting to order. Board member Rod Hite gave the prayer, and all present recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

County Clerk Jessica Fox called the roll. B. Bennett was absent.

Minutes for the September 9, 2021, board meeting were presented for approval. Edwards made motion to approve the minutes as presented. Gergeni seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

At this time, Chairman Coffman called for Public Body Comment. Derek Pearcy addressed the board as a private citizen, informing those in attendance of a recent residency dispute brought against him by the Shelbyville CUSD #4 school district. Carol Cole spoke in support of a petition she has passed to seek changes regarding legislation concerning the county farm and the county's ability to rent this ground for farming purposes. Martha Firnhaber addressed the board regarding the loss of 2 auditing firms in the past 3 years and suggested the board take into consideration audit findings. Kirk Allen informed the board the fix for the county farm issue would be a constitutional amendment and reminded the board of the required audit within 180 days of a change in Sheriff. Marsha White questioned if the board had changed since Feb. of 2019 when she started attending meetings. She questioned if the board is trying to do "legal" or are they just following the "good ole boy system?". Sandra Graven questioned if Shelby County farming the "poor farm" is illegal and unconstitutional than why were 40 other counties in IL currently conducting the same practice?

Chairman Coffman presented a request for Shelby County to reserve the domain shelbycounty-il.gov as required within 1 year by SB 0825 (10 ILCS 5/1-18). David Woods with Mytec Solutions, who does managed services work for Shelby County answered questions from the board. M. Bennett made motion to approve this request. Pogue seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

Dennis Drnjevic presented a proclamation recognizing the Shelbyville VFW Post 4829 for their charitable contributions to the community. Discussion was held regarding the recognition of other organizations within the county and how the county will pick and choose?

Drnjevic made motion to approve the proclamation. Williams seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

John Vanderburg CPA, with 20/20 Forensics, addressed the board to provide an update regarding his company's progress on the payroll audit of the Sheriff's office. Vanderburg's firm, 2020 Forensics, was hired in December of 2020 to perform a payroll audit at the Sheriff's Department for the period of Jan 2015- July 2020. Vanderburg informed the board his company has dug through a mountain of information and encouraged the board to take seriously the numerous amounts of issues and problems regarding payroll that need resolved. Vanderburg stated they have uncovered a "mountain" of errors and problems resulting from the Sheriff's office changing to 10 hour shifts in 2015 and provisions in the FOP Union contract that are simply not being followed. Vanderburg gave an example to quantify the errors by looking at 1 employee over 1 year which resulted in net errors of \$17,753.99. Benefit time and comp time has been paid based on an 8-hour workday instead of a 10-hour workday, employees have gone deficit with sick time, vacation time has been given on a calendar year when the FOP contract states anniversary date, SLEP and IMRF had been paid incorrectly as well. Dates for the "step" pay scale were not updated from 2011 to 2015. Vanderburg stated the contract was very poor at best. Vanderburg stated the county is at a sizeable risk from the Dept. of Labor due to overtime not being paid when it should have been. W-2 errors were also discussed, and correction of these items strongly encouraged. Vanderburg stated "who owes who what", is a horribly complicated question to answer, due to the errors in the rate of pay, and failure of the county to pay overtime based on the 10-hour shifts. Immediate steps need to be taken to correct issues. Vanderburg has had some conversations with some of the board members regarding this audit, and the fact that no memorandum of agreement or any board action was taken when the Sheriff's office went to 4-10 hour shifts in January of 2015 is quite concerning. Vanderburg stated if this would have been done many of the issues would have been remedied. Discussion was also had about the payroll policy that was passed and still isn't being followed. The fact there is no electronic timekeeping methods are also not ideal. Vanderburg stated his firm found significantly more problems than expected for a County this size. Vanderburg expects the audit to be completed in either November or December.

Shelby County's auditor West & Co. has notified the County that they will withdrawal from the contract to provide audit services. State's Attorney Nichole Kroncke informed the board that in the letter of engagement the County signed, West & Co. have the option to withdrawal their services so there was no need for the board to vote on this matter. Shelby County will need to begin the search for a new auditing firm as soon as possible to begin the audit for the fiscal year that just ended August 31, 2021.

At this time Chairman Coffman called for the Highway Engineer's report.

Alan Spesard, County Highway Engineer, requested approval for a petition and an agreement. Spesard presented a petition from the Big Spring Township Highway Commissioner to replace a box culvert located at 400N/3125E 3 miles northwest of Sigel. Estimated costs is \$18,000 and will be split 50/50 between the township and the county.

Orman made motion to approve the petition. Tate seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

Spesard next presented an agreement for construction engineering oversite with Hampton, Lenzini and Renwick for Phase 1 of the Federal Land Access Program for the Country Club Road project (Co Hwy 5). This project is 100% funded and estimate at over 2 million dollars. The costs for this engineering construction oversite are \$132,940 and will also use the services of Hammond and Reid Land Surveying LTD, who the county signed an agreement with last month. The use of Hammond & Reid resulted in a savings of \$41,860 in expenses for the engineering oversite.

Slifer made motion to approve the agreement. Gergeni seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

Continuing with updates, Spesard reported the Flat Branch township bridge is open and had the final inspection by IDOT completed on September 16. Everything is complete on this job, but the final audit. The bridge replacement in Rose Township was delayed by 2 weeks due to the delivery of the beams that go on the bridge and the inability of the contractor to get a crane to lift the beams but was now back under construction. This project should be completed by the November board meeting. The bridge on the Oconee/Cold Spring Township lines has had the contract signed by both the County and the contractor and sent to IDOT for approval. This project will be funded by motor fuel tax funds. Spesard has been working on several transitional projects, as he prepares to retire at the end of the month. Spesard has met with about ½ of the 24 highway commissioners to assist with their yearly MFT budgets for next year and will get those submitted to IDOT. Spesard reported the County will vote on the MFT budget at the November 10<sup>th</sup> meeting. Spesard also informed the board he will complete the 5-year plan for the County (FY 2023-2027) and submit that to IDOT by the end of the month, as required annually. Rock and culverts will be bid on December 3rd and oil, cold mix, and rock hauling will be bid on February 4th. ROW is still being obtained for the Westervelt bridge and 5 parcels still need to be taken for the Country Club Road project. These projects are scheduled to be let by the State on January 21, 2022. The bridge in Shelbyville Township is in the program for IDOT to be bid on June 17, 2022. A drainage structure located near Herborn on 600N in Prairie Township should be bid in late summer of next year and is funded with Prairie Township's Rebuild Illinois funds. A bridge on the Moweaqua County Highway is scheduled to be built next year and will be funded with Rebuild Illinois funds. Spesard also presented the IDOT MFT audit, which was completed a couple of months ago, which was a very good report and will be placed on file in the board records. The road and bridge minutes contain a project list and Spesard asked people to call him if they had questions. It was announced this meeting would be Alan's last due to his retirement at the end of October. Spesard was thanked for his service and received a round of applause.

Chairman Coffman stated there had not been a lot of responses for the Highway Engineers position, the Road and Bridge committee will begin interviews in the next couple of weeks.

Zoning Administrator Bill Schmitz presented the amended Zoning Ordinance for Wind Farms, which Schmitz feels protects the citizens of the County, but also allows for companies to come in under the guidance of the county to construct a wind farm. Shelby County's ordinance closely mirrors Christian County's ordinance and to date there are no wind farms in Christian County. Discussion was held about the current moratorium in place. It is felt that eventually the zoning of wind farms will fall under control of the State. State's Attorney Kroncke reported that eventually the current moratorium will have to be lifted but recommended this new wind ordinance be passed first as it is very restrictive. The moratorium will be in place until lifted by the board, but this new wind ordinance will protect the County.

Drnjevic made motion to approve the Wind Ordinance. Patterson seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

The order of the agenda was changed to address the FOP contract prior to passing the proposed merit commission rules. The board members had just received the FOP contract this morning and had little time for review. In addition, the State's Attorney's office will review the contract to make sure everything is in order after the discussion from John Vanderburg. It was asked if Assistant State's Attorney Jay Scott could present the contract at the next meeting, since he worked on it.

Orman made motion to table the FOP contract. Gergeni seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

Patterson made motion to table the Merit Commission Rules, Regulations and Procedures. Simpson seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

Board member Dennis Drnjevic requested the board ask the Illinois Association of County Board Members to work on the County's behalf to draft legislative changes related to the leasing of county owned farm ground to private farmers. Discussion was held.

Drnjevic made motion to request the IACBM to work for Shelby County regarding this issue. Slifer seconded said motion. Drnjevic requested a roll call vote on this item. Ayes: Barr, M. Bennett, Boehm, Canaday, Coffman, Drnjevic, Durbin, Edwards, Gergeni, Hite, Lenz, Orman, Patterson, Pogue, Simpson, Slifer, Swits, Tate and Williams. Nay: Pearcy. Motion passes (19 yes, 1 no – Pearcy).

Items related to reapportionment and reduction of the county board were withdrawn by both board member Derek Pearcy and chairman Coffman and will be discussed at a later date.

County Clerk Jessica Fox requested authorization from the board to sign the agreement with Bruce Harris and Associates to complete the redistricting maps for Shelby County. The cost is \$8,012 and will be paid from the GIS special fund account.

Hite made motion to approve the authorization. Canaday seconded said motion, which passed by roll call vote (20 yes, 0 no). Ayes: Barr, M. Bennet, Boehm, Canaday, Coffman, Drnjevic, Durbin, Edwards, Gergeni, Hite, Lenz, Orman, Patterson, Pearcy, Pogue, Simpson, Slifer, Swits, Tate and Williams. Nay: none.

Farm Committee Chair Jesse Durbin requested approval from the board to change the county order of business by increasing the members of the Farm Committee from 3 to 5. There is currently a vacancy on the Farm Committee. Current members Durbin and M. Bennett support this action.

Durbin made motion to change the order of business regarding farm committee size. M. Bennett seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote.

County Clerk Jessica Fox requested the board approve a polling in change for the Moweaqua 1 and 2 polling places from the Moweaqua Village Hall to the Central A & M High School for the June 28 and November 8, 2022, Elections. The reason for this requested change is to increase room in the polling place, more availability of parking and increased accessibility.

Gergeni made motion to approve the polling place change. Hite seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

#### Shelby County Board October 14, 2021

Chairman Coffman called for committee reports. (Committee reports are attached to these minutes). Reports were given and items presented for follow-up or for public awareness were as follows:

As road and bridge chairman Coffman repeated the committee would begin interviewing applicants for the county highway engineer's position in the next couple of weeks.

Public building chair Don Tate updated the board that the committee has learned of an elevator cooperative that would allow the county to join and could result in getting the elevator up to code and working properly at a greatly reduced expense. The registration for the cooperative is online and there are no costs to join. As of right now the window project is up in the air.

Gary Patterson reported on the West Central Development Council CEO board meeting he attended as Coffman's appointee.

Under chairman updates, Coffman reported he was assigning Fees/Salaries and the Misc./Ambulance committee to review use for the American Rescue Plan monies the County has been awarded. Ideas were submitted by county departments.

Coffman reminded the board members about the poverty simulation exercise to be held at Windsor High School on Friday, October 29 from 1:00-3:00PM. The University of Illinois Cooperative Extension will be conducting this exercise.

Coffman also informed board members about the UCCI fall conference and membership meeting to be held on Saturday, October 23 at 8:30 AM in Springfield, IL.

Chairman Coffman requested the following committee appointments:

Robert Orman to the Finance Committee. Motion by Gergeni, seconded by M. Bennett. All voted aye by voice (20 yes, 0 no).

Lynn Williams to Fees/Salaries Committee. Motion by Barr. Seconded by Tate. All voted aye by voice (20 yes, 0 no).

Jeff Slifer to Farm Committee. Motion by Durbin. Seconded by M. Bennett. All voted aye by voice (20 yes, 0 no).

Robert Orman to Farm Committee. Motion by M. Bennett. Seconded by Durbin. All voted aye by voice (20 yes, 0 no).

Bryon Coffman to Farm Committee. Motion by M. Bennett. Seconded by Durbin. All voted aye by voice (20 yes, 0 no).

Julie Edwards to the Airport Committee. Motion by Drnjevic. Seconded by Canaday. All voted aye by voice (20 yes, 0 no).

Don Tate to the Legislative Committee as Chair. Motion by Slifer. Seconded by M. Bennett. All voted aye by voice (20 yes, 0 no).

Mark Beyers as Commissioner for the Combined Drainage District #2 Town of Tower Hill for a 3-year term. Motion by M. Bennett. Seconded by Tate. All voted aye by voice (20 yes, 0 no).

Chairman Coffman had no correspondence.

Williams made motion to approve the payment of claims as reviewed by the respective committees. Tate seconded said motion, which passed by roll call vote (20 yes, 0 n0) Aye: Barr, M. Bennett, Boehm, Canaday, Coffman, Drnjevic, Durbin, Edwards, Gergeni, Hite, Lenz, Orman, Patterson, Pearcy, Pogue, Simpson, Slifer, Swits, Tate and Williams. Nay: none.

There was no further business to come before the Shelby County Board.

Orman made motion to adjourn until the next regular meeting to be held on Wednesday, November 10, 2021. Lenz seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no) and the meeting was adjourned at 9:13 P.M.

AN ACT concerning elections.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Election Code is amended by changing Sections 2A-1.1, 2A-1.2, 2A-26, 2A-28, 7-4, 7-8, 7-10, 7-10.2, 7-12, 7-13, 7-14, 7-16, 7-17, 7-43, 7-59, 7-60, 7-61, 8-5, 8-8, 8-8.1, 8-10, 8-17, 9-8.10, 9-13, 10-3, 10-4, 10-5.1, 10-6, 10-7, 10-8, 10-14, 16-3, 16-5.01, 17-13, 17-16.1, 18-9.1, 19-2, 19-3, 19A-15, 19A-20, 23-6.1, 25-6, and 29-15 and by adding Sections 1-18, 1A-60, 1A-65, 2A-1.1b, 2A-1.1c, 11-8, 17-13.5, 19-2.4, and 19-2.5 as follows:

(10 ILCS 5/1-18 new)

Sec. 1-18. Cybersecurity.

- (a) Each election authority maintaining a website shall begin utilizing a ".gov" website address and a ".gov" electronic mail address for each employee within one year of the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 102nd General Assembly. The integrity of election authorities' websites and electronic mail addresses shall be protected using electronic mail security products provided by the Illinois Department of Innovation and Technology or a third-party vendor.
- (b) Each election authority shall perform an organizational risk assessment through the Cyber Navigator Program on a biennial basis.
- (c) Each election authority shall begin performing monthly vulnerability scans to defend against cyber breaches within 6 months after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 102nd General Assembly.
- (d) Each election authority shall begin using endpoint detection and response security tools on all computers utilized by employees within one year of the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 102nd General Assembly.

# CNP Workshop New Cyber Security Requirements for Illinois Election Authorities

Public Act 102-15 (effective June 17, 2021)

September 8, 2021 - 10:00 a.m.

What the law says: Each election authority maintaining a website shall begin utilizing a ".gov" website address and a ".gov" electronic mail address for each employee within one year of the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 102nd General Assembly. The integrity of election authorities' websites and electronic mail addresses shall be protected using electronic mail security products provided by the Illinois Department of Innovation and Technology or a third-party vendor.

## Sign up for a .gov Domain: Information for Election Officials

CISA officially took over the registration of the .gov a few months ago and I have included a few helpful websites to share with local IT services on transitioning to a DOTGOV and one specific to elections. CISA also developed a flyer with helpful information. The flyer is attached.

## Who can obtain a .gov domain and what are the requirements?

The Eligibility section of our domain requirements says:

Only U.S.-based government and public sector organizations are eligible to obtain a .gov domain. This includes any federal, state, local, or territorial government entity, or other publicly controlled entity. It also includes any tribal government recognized by the federal government or a state government. Eligibility is determined by the DotGov Program, which will be informed by the United States Census Bureau's <u>criteria for classifying governments</u>.

## We're an elections office. Who is our authorizing authority?

In general, elections offices maintain legal or practical autonomy from a municipality. Elections offices should follow the requirements for <u>independent intrastate</u> domains. The authorization authority is the highest election official. For state-level election

offices, the authorizing authority is typically the state's chief election official. For locallevel election offices, the highest level election official is typically the elected or appointed official that runs the office.

What the law says: Each election authority shall perform an organizational risk assessment through the Cyber Navigator Program on a biennial basis.

These biennial risk assessments will be scheduled in July or August of odd numbered years in coordination with the annual cyber security training required for cyber navigator program participants. Many have already taken place for this reporting period. Contact your cyber navigator for more details and scheduling.

What the law says: Each election authority shall begin performing monthly vulnerability scans to defend against cyber breaches within 6 months after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 102nd General Assembly

Many election authorities are already engaged in vulnerability scans to their websites and systems. If you need to sign up for free services, CISA provides free cyber hygiene services. Additionally, if you plan to use a third-party vendor, costs associated with these scans are reimbursable using HAVA Election Security funds, if available.

Adversaries use known vulnerabilities and phishing attacks to compromise the security of organizations. The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) offers several scanning and testing services to help organizations reduce their exposure to threats by taking a proactive approach to mitigating attack vectors.

- Vulnerability Scanning: Evaluates external network presence by executing continuous scans of public, static IPs for accessible services and vulnerabilities. This service provides weekly vulnerability reports and ad-hoc alerts.
- Web Application Scanning: Evaluates known and discovered publicly-accessible websites for
  potential bugs and weak configuration to provide recommendations for mitigating web
  application security risks.

- **Phishing Campaign Assessment**: Provides an opportunity for determining the potential susceptibility of personnel to phishing attacks. This is a practical exercise intended to support and measure the effectiveness of security awareness training.
- Remote Penetration Test: Simulates the tactics and techniques of real-world adversaries to
  identify and validate exploitable pathways. This service is ideal for testing perimeter defenses,
  the security of externally-available applications, and the potential for exploitation of open
  source information.

Additionally, CISA recommends you further protect your organization by identifying assets that are searchable via online tools and taking steps to reduce that exposure.

What the law says: Each election authority shall begin using endpoint detection and response security tools on all computers utilized by employees within one year of the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 102nd General Assembly.

Crowdstrike is available for all CNP participants. Many election authorities are already taking advantage of this free service. If you are not utilizing the free offerings, you will need to provide endpoint protection through a third-party vendor. Costs associated may be reimbursed using HAVA election security grants funds if available.

## Increasing trusted information

State and local election offices are increasingly tasked with countering false or misleading information about an election on top of administering an election. One concrete response election officials can take to address this problem is to make it easy to identify official election websites on the internet, a task made simple by .gov.

gov is a 'top-level domain', or TLD, similar to .com, .org, or .us. Individuals and enterprises use a TLD to register a domain name (often simply called a domain) for use in their online services, like a website or email. The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) administers the .gov TLD and makes it available solely to U.S.-based government organizations and publicly controlled entities. For election offices and all qualifying entities, it's available at no cost.

Using a .gov domain for your online services helps the public quickly identify your website as a trusted government source. This is different from other wellknown TLDs, where anyone in the world can register for a fee. Malicious actors know this, and have sought to impersonate election organizations using non .gov domains.

Additionally, using .gov increases your security:

- Multi-factor authentication is enforced on all accounts in the .gov registrar, which may not be the case for other commercial registrars.
- .gov domains are 'preloaded', which requires browsers to use only a secure HTTPS connection with your website. This helps protect your visitors' privacy and helps ensure the content you publish is exactly what's received.
- You can add a security contact for your domain, making it easier for the public to tell you about a potential security issue with your online services.

Since the services contemplated under the AGREEMENT are professional in nature, it is understood that the ENGINEER, acting as an individual, partnership, firm or legal entity, qualifies for professional status and will be governed by professional ethics in its relationship to the LPA and the DEPARTMENT. The LPA acknowledges the professional and ethical status of the ENGINEER by entering into an AGREEMENT on the basis of its qualifications and experience and determining its compensation by mutually satisfactory negotiations.

#### THE ENGINEER AGREES,

- 1. To perform or be responsible for the performance of the Scope of Services presented in EXHIBIT A for the LPA in connection with the proposed improvements herein before described.
- The Classifications of the employees used in the work shall be consistent with the employee classifications and estimated staff hours. If higher-salaried personnel of the firm, including the Principal Engineer, perform services that are to be performed by lesser-salaried personnel, the wage rate billed for such services shall be commensurate with the payroll rate for the work performed.
- 3. That the ENGINEER shall be responsible for the accuracy of the work and shall promptly make necessary revisions or corrections required as a result of the ENGINEER'S error, omissions or negligent acts without additional compensation. Acceptance of work by the LPA or DEPARTMENT will not relieve the ENGINEER of the responsibility to make subsequent correction of any such errors or omissions or the responsibility for clarifying ambiguities.
- 4. That the ENGINEER will comply with applicable Federal laws and regulations, State of Illinois Statutes, and the local laws or ordinances of the LPA.
- 5. To pay its subconsultants for satisfactory performance no later than 30 days from receipt of each payment from the LPA.
- 6. To invoice the LPA for Preliminary and/or Design Engineering: The ENGINEER shall submit all invoices to the LPA within three months of the completion of the work called for in the AGREEMENT or any subsequent Amendment or Supplement.
- To submit a completed BLR 05613, Engineering Payment Report, to the DEPARTMENT within three months of the completion of the work called for in this AGREEMENT or any subsequent Amendment or Supplement. The form shall be submitted with the final invoice.
- 8. The ENGINEER or subconsultant shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the performance of this AGREEMENT. The ENGINEER shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR part 26 in the administration of US Department of Transportation (US DOT) assisted contract. Failure by the Engineer to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this AGREEMENT, which may result in the termination of this AGREEMENT or such other remedy as the LPA deems appropriate.
- 9. That none of the services to be furnished by the ENGINEER shall be sublet assigned or transferred to any other party or parties without written consent of the LPA. The consent to sublet, assign or otherwise transfer any portion of the services to be furnished by the ENGINEER shall be construed to relieve the ENGINEER of any responsibility for the fulfillment of this AGREEMENT.
- 10. For Construction Engineering Contracts:
  - (a) The ENGINEER shall be prequalified with the STATE in Construction Inspection. All employees of the ENGINEER serving as the onsite resident construction supervisor or providing construction inspection shall have a valid Documentation of Contract Quantities certification.
  - (b) For all projects where testing is required, the ENGINEER shall obtain samples according to the STATE Bureau of Materials. "Manual of Test Procedures for Materials," submit STATE Bureau of Materials inspection reports; and verify compliance with contract specifications.
- 11. That the engineering services shall include all equipment, instruments, supplies, transportation and personnel required to perform the duties of the ENGINEER in connection with this AGREEMENT See Exhibit C).

#### II. THE LPA AGREES,

- 1. To certify by execution of this AGREEMENT that the selection of the ENGINEER was performed in accordance with the following:
  - (a) Professional Services Selection Act (50 ILCS 510), The Brooks Act (40 USC 11), and the Procurement, Management, and Administration of Engineering, and Design Related Services (23 CFR part 172). Exhibit D is required to be completed with this AGREEMENT.
- 2. To furnish the ENGINEER all presently available survey data, plans, specifications, and project information.
- For Construction Engineering Contracts:
  - (a) To furnish a full time LPA employee to be In Responsible Charge authorized to administer inherently governmental PROJECT activities.
  - (b) To submit approved forms BC 775 and BC 776 to the DEPARTMENT when federal funds are utilized.

4. To pay the ENGINEER:

- (a) progressive payments Upon receipt of monthly invoices from the ENGINEER and the approvalue feof by the LPA, monthly payments for the work performed shall be due and payable to the ENGINEER, such payments to be equal to the value of the partially completed work minus all previous partial payments made to the ENGINEER.
- (b) Final Payment Upon approval of the work by the LPA but not later than 60 days after the work is completed and reports have been made and accepted by LPA and DEPARTMENT, a sum of money equal to the basic fee as determined in this AGREEMENT less the total of the amount of partial payments previously paid to the ENGINEER shall be due and payable to the ENGINEER.
- 5. To pay the ENGINEER as compensation for all services rendered in accordance with the AGREEMENT on the basis of the following compensation method as discussed in 5-5.10 of the BLR Manual.

The recipient shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national original or sex in the award and performance of any US DOT-assisted contract or in the administration of its DBE program or the requirements of 49 CFR part 26. The recipient shall take all necessary and reasonable steps under 49 CFR part 26 to ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of US DOT-assisted contracts. The recipient's DBE program, as required by 49 CFR part 26 and as approved by US DOT, is incorporated by reference in this agreement. Implementation of this program is a legal obligation and failure to carry out its terms shall be treated as violation of this AGREEMENT. Upon notification to the recipient of its failure to carry out its approved program, the Department may impose sanctions as provided for under part 26 and may, in appropriate cases, refer the matter for enforcement under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act of 1986 (31 U.S.C 3801 et seq.).
- 7. To certify by execution of the AGREEMENT that the selection of the ENGINEER was performed n accordance with the Local Government Professional Services Selection Act 50 ILCS 510, the Brooks Act 40 USC 11, and Procurement, Management, and Administration of Engineering and Design related Services (23 CRF part 172). Exhibit C is required to be completed with this agreement.
- III. IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED,
  - 1. No work shall be commenced by the ENGINEER prior to issuance by the IDOT of a written Notice to Proceed.
  - 2. To maintain, for a minimum of 3 years after the completion of the contract, adequate books, records and supporting documents to verify the amount, recipients and uses of all disbursements of funds passing in conjunction with the contract; the contract and all books, records and supporting documents related to the contract shall be available for review and audit by the Auditor General, and the DEPARTMENT, the Federal Highways Administration (FHWA) or any authorized representative of the federal government, and to provide full access to all relevant materials. Failure to maintain the books, records and supporting documents required by this section shall establish a presumption in favor of the DEPARTMENT for the recovery of any funds paid by the DEPARTMENT under the contract for which adequate books, records and supporting documentation are not available to support their purported disbursement.
  - 3. That the ENGINEER shall be responsible for any and all damages to property or persons arising out of an error, omission and/or negligent act in the prosecution of the ENGINEER's work and shall indemnify and save harmless the LPA, the DEPARMTENT, and their officers, agents, and employees from all suits, claims, actions or damage liabilities, costs or damages of any nature whatsoever resulting there from. These indemnities shall not be limited by the listing of any insurance policy.
    - The LPA will notify the ENGINEER of any error or omission believed by the LPA to be caused by the negligence of the ENGINEER as soon as practicable after the discovery. The LPA reserves the right to take immediate action to remedy any error or omission if notification is not successful; if the ENGINEER fails to reply to a notification; or if the conditions created by the error or omission are in need of urgent correction to avoid accumulation of additional construction costs or damages to property and reasonable notice is not practicable.
  - 4. This AGREEMENT may be terminated by the LPA upon giving notice in writing to the ENGINEER at the ENGINEER's last known post office address. Upon such termination, the ENGINEER shall cause to be delivered to the LPA all drawings, plats, surveys, reports, permits, agreements, soils and foundation analysis, provisions, specifications, partial and completed estimates and data, if any from soil survey and subsurface investigation with the understanding that all such material becomes the property of the LPA. The LFA will be responsible for reimbursement of all eligible expenses incurred under the terms of this AGREEMENT up to the date of the written notice of termination.

- 5. In the every at the DEPARMENT stops payment to the LPA, the LPA may suspend work on the project. If this suspended by the LPA for more than thirty (30) calendar days, consecutive or in aggregate, over the term of this AGREEMENT, the ENGINEER shall be compensated for all services performed and reimbursable expenses incurred as a result of the suspension and resumption of its services, and the ENGINEER's schedule and fees for the remainder of the project shall be equitably adjusted.
- 6. This AGREEMENT shall continue as an open contract and the obligations created herein shall remain in full force and effect until the completion of construction of any phase of professional services performed by others based upon the service provided herein. All obligations of the ENGINEER accepted under this AGREEMENT shall cease if construction or subsequent professional services are not commenced within 5 years after final payment by the LPA.
- 7. That the ENGINEER shall be responsible for any and all damages to property or persons arising out of an error, omission and/or negligent acc in the prosecution of the ENGINEER's work and shall indemnify and have harmless the LPA, the DEPARTMENT, and their officers, employees from all suits, claims, actions or damages liabilities, costs or damages of any nature whatsoever resulting there from. These indemnities shall not be limited by the listing of any insurance policy.
- 8. The ENGINEER and LPA certify that their respective firm or agency:
  - (a) has not employed or retained for commission, percentage, brokerage, contingent fee or other considerations, any firm or person (other than a bona fide employee working solely for the LPA or the ENGINEER) to solicit or secure this AGREEMENT.
  - (b) has not agreed, as an express or implied condition for obtaining this AGREEMENT, to employ or retain the services of any firm or person in connection with carrying out the AGREEMENT or
  - (c) has not paid, or agreed to pay any firm, organization or person (other than a bona fide employee working solely for the LPA or the ENGINEER) any fee, contribution, donation or consideration of any kind for, or in connection with, procuring or carrying out the AGREEMENT.
  - (d) that neither the ENGINEER nor the LPA is/are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency,
  - (e) has not within a three-year period preceding the AGREEMENT been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain or performing a public (Federal, State or local) transaction; violation of Federal or State antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements or receiving stolen property,
  - (f) are not presently indicated for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a government entity (Federal, State or local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in paragraph (e) and
  - (g) has not within a three-year period preceding this AGREEMENT had one or more public transaction (Federal, State or local) terminated for cause or default.

Where the ENGINEER or LPA is unable to certify to any of the above statements in this certification, an explanation shall be attached to this AGREEMENT.

- In the event of delays due to unforeseeable causes beyond the control of and without fault or negligence of the ENGINEER no claim for damages shall be made by either party. Termination of the AGREEMENT or adjustment of the fee for the remaining services may be requested by either party if the overall delay from the unforeseen causes prevents completion of the work within six months after the specified completion date. Examples of unforeseen causes include but are not limited to: acts of God or a public enemy; act of the LPA, DEPARTMENT, or other approving party not resulting from the ENGINEER's unacceptable services; fire; strikes; and floods.
  - If delays occur due to any cause preventing compliance with the PROJECT SCHEDULE, the ENGINEER shall apply in writing to the LPA for an extension of time. If approved, the PROJECT SCHEDULE shall be revised accordingly.
- 10. This certification is required by the Drug Free Workplace Act (30 ILCS 580). The Drug Free Workplace Act requires that no grantee or contractor shall receive a grant or be considered for the purpose of being awarded a contract for the procurement of any property or service from the DEPARTMENT unless that grantee or contractor will provide a drug free workplace. False certification or violation of the certification may result in sanctions including, but not limited or suspension of contract on grant payments, termination of a contract or grant and debarment of the contracting or grant opportunities with the DEPARTMENT for at least one (1) year but not more than (5) years.

For the purpose of this certification, "grantee" or "Contractor" means a corporation, partnership or an entity with twenty-five (25) or more employees at the time of issuing the grant or a department, division or other unit thereof, directly responsible for the specific performance under contract or grant of \$5,000 or more from the DEPARTMENT, as defined the Act.

The contractor/grantee certifies and agrees that it will provide a drug free workplace by:

- (a) Publishing a statement:
  - (1) Notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of a controlled substance, including cannabis, is prohibited in the grantee's or contractor's workplace.
  - (2) Specifying actions that will be taken against employees for violations of such prohibition.
  - (3) Notifying the employee that, as a condition of employment on such contract or grant, the employee will:
    - (a) abide by the terms of the statement; and
    - (b) notify the employer of any criminal drug statue conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace no later than (5) days after such conviction.
- (b) Establishing a drug free awareness program to inform employees about:



- (1) The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
- (2) The grantee's or contractor's policy to maintain a drug free workplace;
- (3) Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation and employee assistance program; and
- (4) The penalties that may be imposed upon an employee for drug violations.
- (c) Providing a copy of the statement required by subparagraph (a) to each employee engaged in the performance of the contract or grant and to post the statement in a prominent place in the workplace.
- (d) Notifying the contracting, or granting agency within ten (10) days after receiving notice under part (b) of paragraph (3) of subsection (a) above from an employee or otherwise, receiving actual notice of such conviction.
- (e) Imposing a sanction on, or requiring the satisfactory participation in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program.
- (f) Assisting employees in selecting a course of action in the event drug counseling, treatment and rehabilitation is required and indicating that a trained referral team is in place.

Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug free workplace through implementation of the Drug Free Workplace Act, the ENGINEER, LPA and the Department agree to meet the PROJECT SCHEDULE outlined in EXHIBIT B. Time is of the essence on this project and the ENGINEER's ability to meet the PROJECT SCHEDULE will be a factor in the LPA selecting the ENGINEER for future project. The ENGINEER will submit progress reports with each invoice showing work that was completed during the last reporting period and work they expect to accomplish during the following period.

- Due to the physical location of the project, certain work classifications may be subject to the Prevailing Wage Act (820 ILCS 130/0.01 et seq.).
- 12. For Construction Engineering Contracts:

Prime Consultant

- (a) That all services are to be furnished as required by construction progress and as determined by the LPA employee In Responsible Charge. The ENGINEER shall complete all services herein within a time considered reasonable to the LPA, after the CONTRACTOR has completed the construction contract.
- (b) That all field notes, test records and reports shall be turned over to and become the property of the LPA and that during the performance of the engineering services herein provided for, the ENGINEER shall be responsible for any loss or damage to the documents herein enumerated while they are in the ENGINEER's possession and any such loss or damage shall be restored at the ENGINEER's expense.
- (c) That any difference between the ENGINEER and the LPA concerning the interpretation of the provisions of this AGREEMENT shall be referred to a committee of disinterested parties consisting of one member appointed by the ENGINEER, one member appointed by the LPA, and a third member appointed by the two other members for disposition and that the committee's decision shall be final.
- (d) That in the event that engineering and inspection services to be furnished and performed by the LPA (including personnel furnished by the ENGINEER) shall, in the opinion of the STATE be incompetent employed on such work at the expense of the LPA.
- (e) Inspection of all materials when inspection is not provided by the sources by the STATE Central Bureau of Materials, and submit inspection reports to the LPA and STATE in accordance with the STATE Central Bureau of Materials "Project Procedures Guide" and the policies of the STATE.

## AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE PLACEMENT OF WIND ENERGY CONVERSION SYSTEMS

WHEREAS, an Application for amendment to the Zoning Ordinance for Shelby County has been made by the Zoning Administrator and said application was referred to the Shelby County Planning Commission for public hearing and at its meeting on August 19, 2021 recommended that such amendments be made by the Shelby County Board; and,

WHEREAS, said application was referred to the Shelby County Board of Appeals for further hearing and at its meeting on August 19, 2021, recommended that such amendments be made by the Shelby County Board; and

WHEREAS, the Zoning Ordinance of Shelby County, No. 05-05 provides for the setting of certain fees to be charged by and paid to Shelby County for various zoning application, permits and appeals;

WHEREAS, this ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form;

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED** by the Shelby County Board that the aforementioned Zoning Ordinance is to be amended as follows:

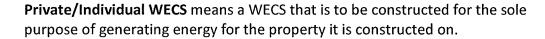
## WIND ENERGY SYSTEM STANDARDS

### **DEFINITIONS**

**Applicant** means the entity or person who submits to the county an application for the siting of any WECS or Substation.

**Campground** means any State or Federal licensed campground.

Financial Assurance means a financial security in the form of a surety bond (performance and payment bond), or a cash escrow account that names Shelby County as the beneficiary. The Applicant may select which of the listed forms of financial security to post, so long as all other conditions in this paragraph are met. If a surety bond (performance and payment bond) is selected, the original of the surety bond shall be held by the County. If a cash escrow is selected, the cash escrow shall be held and managed by an independent third party (e.g., escrow agent or title company) on behalf of the County, subject to escrow instructions that incorporate the applicable decommissioning and repair / replacement / restoration obligations of this Agreement as executed by the County and the Applicant.



**Operator** means the entity responsible for the day-to-day operation and maintenance of the WECS, including any third-party subcontractors.

Owner means the entity or entities with an equity interest in the WECS(s), including the respective successors and assigns. Owner does not mean (i) the property owner from whom land is leased for locating the WECS (unless the property owner has an equity interest in the WECS); or (ii) any person holding a security interest in the WECS(s) solely to secure an extension of credit, or a person foreclosing on such security interest provided that after foreclosure, such person seeks to sell the WECS(s) at the earliest practicable date.

**Professional Engineer** means a qualified individual who is licensed as a professional engineer in any state in the United States.

Primary Structure means, for each property, the structure that one or more persons occupy the majority of time on that property for either business or personal reasons. Primary Structure includes structures such as residences, commercial buildings, hospitals, and day care facilities. Primary Structure excludes structures such as hunting sheds, storage sheds, pool houses, unattached garages and barns.

**Set-back** means distance measured from base or foundation of WECS tower to adjoining property line, Right-of-Way line, foundation of occupied or existing residence or any other measurement point referenced in these regulations.

**Substation** means the apparatus that connects the electrical collection system of the WECS(s) and increases the voltage for connection with the utility's transmission lines.

**Unincorporated Municipality** means any region not governed by a local municipal corporation with fifty (50) or more inhabitants residing within the region.

Wind Energy Conversion System (WECS) means all necessary devices that together convert wind into electricity, including the rotor, nacelle, generator, WECS Tower, electrical components, WECS foundation, transformer, and electrical cabling from the WECS Tower to the Substation(s).

**WECS Project** means the collection of WECS and Substations as specified in the siting approval application of this Ordinance.

**WECS Tower** means the support structure to which the nacelle and rotor are attached.

**WECS Tower Height** means the distance from the rotor blade at its highest point to the top surface of the WECS foundation.

## **Regulation of Commercial Wind Energy Systems (Wind Farms)**

- a. No person shall construct or operate a wind energy conversion system (WECS) without having fully complied with the provisions of this Section. For purposes of this Section, WECS refers solely to each combined wind turbine and tower. All WECS equipment shall be in compliance with all applicable state and federal regulatory standards including the Uniform Building Code as adopted by the State of Illinois, the National Electrical Code as adopted by the State of Illinois, FAA requirements, EPA regulations (hazardous waste, construction, storm water; etc.) and any other statutory or regulatory requirements.
- b. Facility equipment shall conform to applicable industry standards including the American Wind Energy Association standards for wind turbine design and related standards adopted by the American Standards Institute (ANSI). Applicants shall submit certificates from equipment manufacturers that the equipment is manufactured in compliance with industry standards.

### **Permits Required**

- a. A WECS permit shall be obtained from the Zoning Administrator for the construction of all WECS.
- b. A building Permit shall be obtained to allow construction of WECS.

## **Application Requirements**

- a. An application for a permit to build a wind energy system shall include the following:
- b. A WECS Project summary, including, to the extent available: (1) a general description of the project, including its approximate name plate generating capacity; the potential equipment manufacturer(s), type(s) of WECS(s), number of WECSs, and name plate generating capacity of each WECS; the maximum height of the WECS Tower(s) and maximum diameter of the WECS(s) rotor(s); the general location of the project; and (2) a description of the Applicant, Owner, and Operator, including their respective business structures.
- c. The name(s), address(es), and phone number(s) of the Applicant(s), Owner and Operator, and all property owner(s), if known.

- d. Petitioner will provide a graphic Site Plan Exhibit including the easement boundaries final site location and legal descriptions for each site to the Zoning Administrator for approval before construction begins. Petitioner will furnish the Zoning Administrator with certified "as built" site plans and easement descriptions drawings showing the location of wind turbines, roads, transmission lines and all other improvements. A topographic map of the project site shall include the project site and the surrounding area.
- e. Location of all above-ground utility lines within a radius equal to two (2) times the height of the proposed WECS.
- f. Location of all underground utility lines on the WECS site.
- g. Dimensional representation of the structural components of the tower construction including the base and footings.
- h. Schematic of electrical systems associated with the WECS including all existing and proposed electrical connections.
- i. Manufacturer's specifications and installation and operation instructions or specific WECS design information.
- j. Certification by a registered professional engineer that the tower design is sufficient to withstand wind load requirements for structure as defined by the Building Officials and Code Administrators.
- k. Applicants must agree and sign a written acknowledgement that windmills are considered a permanent structure for tax assessment purposes.
- All turbines shall be new equipment commercially available; no used, experimental or proto-type equipment, still in testing, shall be approved by the Zoning Board of Appeals. Applicant / owner shall provide certifications to the Zoning Board of Appeals that turbines are new, not used, experimental, or proto-type equipment still in testing.

## **Siting Approval and Special Use Application**

- a. To obtain siting approval, the Applicant must submit an application for special use to the County.
- b. The application for a special use permit shall contain or be accompanied by the following information:

- 1. A WECS Project summary, including, to the extent available:
- (1) a general description of the project, including its approximate name plate generating capacity; the actual equipment manufacturer(s), type(s) of WECS(s), number of WECS(s), and name plate generating capacity of each WECS; the maximum height of the WECS Tower(s) and maximum diameter of the WECS(s) rotor(s); the general location of the project; and (2) a description of the Applicant, Owner and Operator, including their respective business structures;
- c. The name(s), address(es), and phone numbers(s) of the Applicant(s), Owner and Operator, and all property owner(s), if known;
- d. A final site plan for the installation of WECS(s) showing the planned location of each WECS Tower, guide lines and anchor bases (if any). Primary Structure(s), property lines (including identification of adjoining properties), setback lines, public access roads and turnout locations, Substation(s), electrical cabling from the WECS Tower to the Substation(s), ancillary equipment, third party transmission lines, layout of all structures within the geographical boundaries of any applicable setback, and the location of any construction staging areas, including concrete batch plans, and the location of all affected drainage districts, the structures, facilities, ditches, drainage tiles, and rights-of-way of the affected drainage districts, and the location of all other agricultural drainage tiles of private landowners;
- e. All required studies, reports, certifications, and approvals demonstrating compliance with the provisions of this Ordinance;
- f. All information necessary to demonstrate compliance with this entire Wind Energy Conversion System Ordinance; and
- g. Any other information normally required by the County as part of its Zoning Ordinance;
- Sufficient documentation that the Applicant, Owner, company, or parent company are generally financially viable and sufficiently experienced to complete the WECS Project as proposed, and both financial viability and experience may be demonstrated by a successful track record on similar projects; and
- i. If the Applicant intends to offer a Good Neighbor Plan or Property Value Guarantee Plan, a copy of such plan shall be included with the special use permit application.
- j. Executed interconnection agreements shall be included with the special use permit application.

- k. The Applicant shall immediately notify Shelby County of any changes to the information provided in Section (b) above that occur while the special use permit application is pending.
- I. The Applicant shall enter into the Agricultural Impact Mitigation Agreement ("AIMA") with the Illinois Department of Agriculture prior to the public hearing for the WECS Project special use application.
- m. The Applicant shall provide notice pursuant to the Shelby County Zoning Code Section 1-11-22 to any "Drainage District," as that term is used in the Illinois Drainage Code (70 ILCS 605/1-1 et seq.), in which any construction is proposed, or which may be affected by the project. The Applicant must consult and work with affected drainage districts to locate, stake and mark all the structures, facilities, ditches, drainage tiles, and rights-of-way of the affected drainage districts prior to the issuance of Building Permits. The issuance of Building Permits for construction of the WECS shall also be conditioned on (1) the Applicant obtaining a license, easement, or right of way from any affected Drainage District consistent with 70 ILCS 605/4-30, and (2) compliance by Applicant, Owner and/or Operator with the construction rules and requirements of the affected drainage districts.
- n. The Applicant, Owner and Operator shall each become a member of the Illinois state-wide One-Call Notice System (otherwise known as the Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators or "JULIE") and provide JULIE with all the information necessary to update its records with respect to the WECS.
- o. <u>Amendments</u> If the Applicant or Operator proposes to make a change in the project, including moving a turbine siting more than 25 feet, then the Applicant or Operator, through the use of a qualified professional, shall appropriately demonstrate compliance with all the requirements of this ordinances at a hearing to amend the special use.

### **Setback Requirements**

- a. No WECS shall be constructed in any setback, dedicated public easement or dedicated public right-of-way without prior written authorization from the landowner, township and county.
- b. Installation of any WECS may not be nearer than 1,500 feet or 1.10 times the height of the WECS, whichever is greatest, to any dedicated roadway or public right of way.
- c. Installation of any WECS may not be nearer than 1,640 feet or 3 times the height, whichever is greatest, to any property line or campground.

- d. Installation of any WECS may not be nearer than 3,250 feet or 5 times the height, whichever is greatest, to any existing or occupied residence.
- e. Installation of any WECS may not be nearer than 700 feet or 1.5 times the height, whichever is greatest, to any railroad right of way or electrical transmission or distribution lines.
- f. Property owners may negotiate setback requirements from an occupied residence or adjoining property lines and submit the agreement, in writing, but shall not be less than 1.5 times the height, in any case.
- g. New structures built adjacent to wind power facilities may be nearer than these minimum setback requirements if property owner submits a waiver in writing, but they shall not be nearer than one thousand five hundred feet or 1.5 times the height, whichever is greatest.
- h. Incorporated communities have the sole authority to regulate the construction of WECS in their jurisdictional boundary and within a 1.5-mile radius of their community. If a community wishes to defer to regulations by the County, an intergovernmental agreement must be approved by both the County and the incorporated community granting the County the authority to regulate that area.
- Installation of any WECS may not be nearer than 1.5 miles from any unincorporated municipality.
- j. Setbacks between towers. The minimum setback distance between towers shall be one 1,500 feet or 1.5 times the height, whichever is greatest.
- k. For any WECS Tower placed within 1.5 miles of the corporate limits of a village or municipality, the Applicant shall provide documentation demonstrating that the village or municipality does not exercise zoning jurisdiction over the area where the WECS Tower will be placed or, if it does, that the village or municipality approves the placement of the WECS Tower whether as a permitted use, special use, or variance, or has adopted an ordinance waiving its authority to regulate the placement of the WECS Tower.
- I. No part of a WECS Tower or foundation shall encroach on a public or private sewage disposal (septic) system.
- m. All WECS Towers shall be set back on the sides a safe distance from private air strip as measured from the center line of the air strip and 5000 feet as measured from the end of a private air strip, in the landing and takeoff area. Owners of the air strip may waive this requirement in writing as part of the Application or as an exhibit made part of the Zoning Board of Appeals hearing pertaining to the specific WECS Project.

# **Design and Installation**

## a. Design Safety Certification

- WECS(s) shall conform to applicable industry standards, including those of the American National Standards Institute ("ANSI"). Applicants shall submit certificates of design compliance that equipment manufacturers have obtained from Underwriters Laboratories ("UL"), Det Norske Veritas ("DNV"), Germanischer Lloyd Wind Energie ("GL"), or an equivalent, agreed to, third party.
  - 2. Following the granting of approval special use permit under this Ordinance, a Professional Engineer shall certify, as part of the building permit application, that the foundation and tower design of the WECS is within accepted professional standards, given local soil and climate conditions.

## b. Controls and Brakes

1. All WECS shall be equipped with a redundant braking system. This includes both aerodynamic overspeed controls (including variable pitch, tip, and other similar systems) and mechanical brakes. Mechanical brakes shall be operated in a fail-safe mode. Stall regulation shall not be considered a sufficient braking system for overspeed protection.

#### c. Components

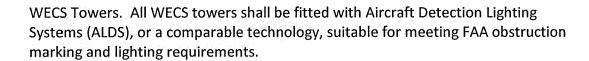
1. All electrical components of the WECS shall conform to applicable local, state, and national codes, and relevant national and international standards (e.g. ANSI and International Electrical Commission).

#### d. Color

Towers and blades shall be painted white or gray or another non-reflective, unobtrusive color.

# e. Compliance with the Federal Aviation Administration

The Applicant for the WECS shall comply with all applicable FAA requirements and shall provide documentation of compliance to the Shelby County Zoning Administrator at the time of filing building permit applications to the County for



# f. Warnings

- 1. A visible warning sign concerning voltage must be placed at the base of all padmounted transformers and Substations,
- 2. Visible, reflective, colored objects, such as flags, reflectors, or tape shall be placed on the anchor points of guy wires and along the guy wires up to a height of 15 feet from the ground.
- 3. Upon completion of the construction of an approved WECS Project, reasonable visible signs, must be placed at the entrance of each access road generally advising trespassers not to approach a turbine.
- 4. Upon completion of the construction of an approved WECS Project, a visible sign that provides an emergency contact number for the Applicant shall be posted on or near the operations and maintenance building.
- 5. The signs in subparagraphs (F)(1)(3) and (4) above shall be made with letters and numbers at least 3 inches in height and shall include the 911 address and an emergency phone number of the Operator which shall be answered 24 hours a day by a live operator. A non-emergency phone number for the Operator shall also be displayed. These phone numbers shall remain active with all calls being recorded for verification purposes and with comments and complaints logged and reported to the County Zoning Administrator on a monthly basis. The recorded calls shall be maintained for at least 12 months.

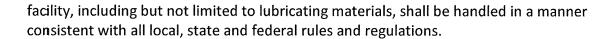
# **Safety Requirements**

a. <u>Blade Clearance</u> The minimum distance between the ground and any protruding blade(s) utilized on a WECS shall be forty (40) feet, as measured at the lowest point of the arc of the blades. The minimum distance shall be increased as necessary to provide for vehicle clearance in locations where over-sized vehicles might travel.

#### b. Climb Prevention

 All WECS Towers must be unclimbable by design or protected by anti-climbing devices such as:

- i. Fences with locking portals at least six feet high; or
- ii. Anti-climbing devices 12 feet vertically from the base of the WECS Tower.
- b. Access to lattice towers shall be controlled by fences six (6) feet in height around the tower and anti-climbing devices. Fences will not be required for tubular towers with an internal ladder and locked door. Existing local regulations shall cover wind systems as well.
- c. <u>Signage</u>. Signage regulations are to be consistent with ANSI and AWEA standards. Signs warning of high voltage shall be posted at least at the entrances of the facility.
- d. Noise and Vibration. At a minimum, noise levels from each WECS or WECS Project shall be in compliance with applicable Illinois Pollution Control Board (IPCB) regulations. The Applicant, through the use of a certified professional, accepted by the Illinois Pollution Control Board, as part of the siting approval application process, shall appropriately demonstrate compliance with the above noise requirements and provide contour maps at intervals of not greater than 5 feet on request by the Zoning Administrator or ZBA. For single use properties, the noise levels should be measured at the property lines. The WECS Project will maintain compliance with the applicable IPCB regulations and this Ordinance throughout the entire operational period of the WECS Project. If at any time throughout the life of the WECS Project, the noise levels are found to not be in compliance with this section, the Applicant will immediately shut off enough turbines to ensure that the noise levels are within acceptable levels until a solution to the noise level violation is found and approved by the County after a hearing at the Zoning Board of Appeals.
- e. <u>Electrical Collection Cables</u>. All WECS electrical collection cables between each WECS shall be located underground unless they are located on public or utility rights-of-way or with prior County approval. All communication lines that are buried should be at a depth consistent with local utility and telecommunication underground lines standards until the same reach the property line or a substation adjacent to the property line.
- f. <u>Tower Construction</u>. Tower construction shall be in accordance with all applicable sections of the Illinois Statutes, if any.
- g. <u>Utility Interconnection</u>. The WECS, if interconnected to a utility system, shall meet the requirements for interconnection and operate as set forth in the electrical utility's then-current service regulations applicable to WECS.
- h. <u>Waste Management.</u> All SOLID WASTE, whether generated from supplies, equipment, parts, packaging, or operation or maintenance of the facility, including old parts and equipment, shall be removed from the site in a timely manner consistent with industry standards. All HAZARDOUS WASTE generated by the operation and maintenance of the



- i. <u>Lighting.</u> A lighting plan must be submitted with the special use application. Such plan must describe all lighting that will be used, including any lighting that may be required by the FAA. Such a plan shall include but is not limited to the planned number and location of lights, light color, and where lights will be flashing. Strobe lights are discouraged and if they are required by the FAA, then they must be shielded from the ground. The lighting should be planned and developed in a way to minimize the visual impact of the structures. A consideration of synchronized lighting shall also be part of any lighting plan. A general description of the lighting plan for the WECS Substation shall be provided with the special use permit application. The WECS Substation lighting plan shall include plans to control glare. A final plan shall be approved prior to issuing a building permit for the WECS Substation.
- j. <u>Birds.</u> A qualified professional, such as an ornithologist or wildlife biologist, shall conduct an avian habitual study, as part of the special use application process, to determine if the installation of WECS(s) will have a substantial adverse impact on birds.

#### **Public Services**

a. <u>Dust Control</u> Dust control measures will be required by the County during construction of the WECS and must be complied with.

#### b. Roads

- 1. An Applicant, Owner, or Operation proposing to use county or township road(s), for the purpose of transporting WECS or Substation parts and/or equipment for construction, operation, or maintenance of the WECS(s) or Substation(s) shall;
  - a. Identify all such public roads; and
  - b. Obtain applicable weight and size permits and easements for placement of cables on or under rights of way from relevant government agencies prior to construction.
- 2. To the extent an Applicant, Owner, or Operator must obtain a weight or size permit from the county and township, the Applicant, Owner or Operator shall:
  - a. Conduct a pre-construction baseline survey to determine existing road conditions for assessing potential future damage, and the need for pre-construction modifications and improvements on existing roadways; and

- b. Provide an approved agreement from all impacted Road Commissioners with the approval of the County Highway Engineer prior to the Applicant filing the Special Use Permit.
- C. Secure Financial Assurance, in an amount agreed to by the relevant parties, which shall be contained in a road use agreement which the parties must enter into before construction begins for the purpose of repairing any damage to public roads caused by constructing, operating or maintaining the WECS
- c. <u>Sewer and Water</u> Any facility shall comply with existing septic and well regulation as required by the Shelby County Health Department and the State of Illinois Department of Public Health and must obtain approval of the Shelby County Highway Department the Shelby County Department of Public Health.
- d. <u>Drainage Repair</u> All damages to waterways, drainage ditches, field tiles, or any other infrastructures caused by the construction or maintenance of the WECS, must be completely repaired to original condition.
- e. <u>Engineer's Certificate</u> The engineer's certificate shall be completed by a structural engineer registered in the State of Illinois and shall certify that the tower and foundation are compatible with and appropriate for the turbine to be installed and that the specific soils at the site can support the apparatus. All commercially installed wind turbines must utilize self-supporting tubular towers.
- f. <u>Certificate of Contracts</u> Certificate shall verify that power purchase contracts, power transmission contracts, and other legal rights are in place.

#### g. Shadow Flicker

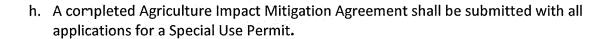
- The special use application for a WECS Project shall include a model study of the number of hours of shadow flicker expected upon each Primary Structure of a nonparticipating property owner in existence at the time the special use application is filed.
  - 2. Shadow flicker shall not be allowed on a Primary Structure. An owner of a Primary Structure can have the option to waive this requirement.

#### **Decommissioning Plan**

a. Petitioner shall ensure that the facilities are properly decommissioned upon the end of the project life or facility abandonment. Petitioner's obligations with respect to

decommissioning shall include removal of all physical material pertaining to the project improvements to a depth of 60" beneath the soil surface, and restoration of the area occupied by the project improvements to the same condition that existed immediately before construction of such improvements. Prior to issuance of a building permit, Petitioner will provide a bond, cash in escrow or other security acceptable to the County, for the cost of decommissioning each tower to be constructed under that building permit, which security shall be released when such tower is decommissioned. Petitioner will provide an affidavit to the Shelby County Zoning Board representing that all easements for wind turbines shall contain terms that provide financial assurance, including access to the salvage value of the equipment, for the property owners to ensure that facilities are properly decommissioned within twelve (12) months of expiration or earlier termination of the project.

- b. An update to this decommissioning plan shall be submitted to the County every three years. In addition, any decommissioning plans signed by the party responsible for decommissioning and the landowner (if different) shall be submitted with the application.
- c. The County reserves the right to require additional information as the County deems necessary to be part of the review of this plan.
- d. Obtaining necessary recorded access easements and necessary recorded utility easements, copies of which shall be submitted to the Zoning Administrator.
- e. No appurtenances other than those associated with the wind turbine operations shall be connected to any wind tower except in accordance with the Shelby County Zoning Ordinance.
- f. The owner operator of the WECS shall maintain a current general liability policy covering bodily injury and property damage and name Shelby County as an additional insured with limits of at least two million dollars (\$2,000,000.00) per occurrence and five million dollars (\$5,000,000.00) in the aggregate with a deductible of no more than five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00). The applicant/owner must provide proof of insurance to the Shelby County Zoning office prior to construction and then on an annual basis. Applicant must also provide proof of insurance upon any material changes to the terms and conditions of the policy.
- g. All contact information including name, phone number, and address of the current property owner, lessor, lessee, the interconnecting utility company, and buyer of the power (if applicable and if this information can be disclosed publicly), shall be submitted annually within 30 days of the anniversary date of the Special Use Permit until decommissioning has been completed at which point the Special Use Permit will be null and void.



# **Required Safety Features**

- a. All WECS shall be designed with an automatic overspeed control to render the system inoperable when winds are blowing in excess of the speeds for which the machine is designed.
- b. All WECS shall have a manually operable method to render the system inoperable in the event of a structural or mechanical failure of any part of the system including the automatic overspeed control.
- c. All WECS shall be designed with an automatic control to render the system inoperable in case of loss of utility power to prevent the WECS from supplying power to a deenergized electrical distribution system.
- d. Any WECS thereof declared to be unsafe by the Zoning Administrator by reason of inadequate maintenance, dilapidation, obsolescence, fire hazard, disaster, damage or abandonment is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and shall be abated by repair, rehabilitation, demolition or removal in accordance with the procedures set forth in the County Ordinances governing the removal of nuisances and these regulations in accordance with the decommissioning plan.

# **Operation**

#### a. Maintenance

- 1. The Owner or Operator of the WECS must submit, on an annual basis, a summary of the operation and maintenance reports to the County. In addition to the above annual summary, the Owner or Operator must furnish such operation and maintenance reports as the County reasonable requests.
- 2. Any physical modification to the WECS that alters the mechanical load, mechanical load path, or major electrical components shall require re-certification under this Ordinance. Like-kind replacements of WECS Towers shall not require recertification but shall require written approval of the County Zoning Administrator. Prior to making any physical modification (other than a like-kind replacement), the owner or operator shall confer with a relevant third-party certifying entity identified in Section VI(A)(1) of this Ordinance and a professional engineer determined by the County Zoning Administrator to determine whether the physical modification requires re-certification.

The cost of the third-party certifying entity and professional engineer shall be paid by the Owner or Operator.

3. Any replacement of equipment that is not a like-kind replacement shall require an amendment to the special use.

# b. Interference

- 1. The Applicant shall provide the applicable microwave transmission providers and local emergency service provider(s) (911 operators) copies of the project summary and site plan, as set forth in this Ordinance. To the extent that the above provider(s) demonstrate a likelihood of interference with its communications resulting from the WECS(s), the Applicant shall take measures to mitigate such anticipated interference. If, after construction of the WECS, the Owner or Operator receives a written complaint related to the above-mentioned interference, the Owner or Operator shall rectify the issue within 30 days.
- 2. If, after construction of the WECS, the Owner or Operator receives a written complaint related to interference with local broadcast residential television via public broadcast and or dish, RTK Ag Correction Signal, Machine to Machine sync communication, wireless data transfer communication, phone, internet, business ban radio, the Owner or Operator shall rectify the issue within 30 days.

## c. Coordination with Local Fire Department

- The Applicant, Owner or Operator shall submit to the local fire department or district whose jurisdiction is included in whole or in part within the WECS project, a copy of the site plan. In addition to the site plan, a plan pertaining to the planning, response, recovery and mitigation of any natural or man-made hazard that may affect the WECS development.
- 2. Upon request by the local fire department, the Owner or Operator shall cooperate with the local fire department to develop the fire department's emergency response plan. The owner or operator shall submit an emergency response plan approved by the fire department(s) having jurisdiction over the project territory, and shall provide a list of all hazardous materials associated with the project on site with the County EMA and all emergency response agencies having jurisdiction over the project territory. The owner or operator shall cover all costs with regard to any training or equipment necessary to execute the emergency response plan.
- 3. Nothing in this section shall alleviate the need to comply with all other applicable fire laws and regulations.

# d. Materials Handling, Storage and Disposal

- 1. All solid wastes related to the construction, operation and maintenance of the WECS shall be removed from the site promptly and disposed of in accordance with all federal, state and local laws.
- 2. All hazardous materials related to the construction, operation and maintenance of the WECS shall be handled, stored, transported and disposed of in accordance with all applicable local, state and federal laws.

# **Inspections**

a. Inspections at a fee to be determined from time to time may be made by the Zoning Administrator or by the Shelby County Board no more than once annually to certify the safety and maintenance of the WECS and accessory structures.

## **Arbitration**

a. In the event a dispute arises as to satisfaction of the forgoing conditions to this special ordinance, such dispute may be resolved judicially or may at the request of the petitioner, county, or the aggrieved party, be resolved pursuant to binding arbitration in accordance with the procedures of the American Arbitration Association by an independent arbitrator acceptable to petitioner and the County or aggrieved party, as applicable. If petitioner and the County or the aggrieved party, as applicable, are unable to agree on an arbitrator, then each such party shall choose an independent arbitrator and their respective choices shall then choose an arbitrator. This condition shall not bind an aggrieved party, other than the County or petitioner, to submit to arbitration. Applicant is responsible for any and all arbitration costs and expenses.

## Further application after completion of project construction.

a. Construction of the wind farm shall begin within 12 months from the date of this Special Use Ordinance. After construction is complete, the "as built" drawing showing the location of wind turbines, roads, transmission lines and all other improvements related to the wind turbine installation shall be delivered to the Zoning Office. Only the land utilized for these wind turbines and related improvements shall be designated for the area of special use permit. Upon completion of construction the surrounding area will be again zoned as originally designated prior to the application for Special Use as if the Special Use had never been granted. Additional wind turbines to be placed on that same parcel of land shall require another petition for recommendation by the planning commission and approval from the Zoning Board of Appeals.



# Regulation of Private/Individual Wind Energy Systems

- a. No person shall construct or operate a wind energy conversion system (WECS) without having fully complied with the provisions of this Section. For purposes of this Section, WECS refers solely to each combined wind turbine and tower. All WECS equipment shall be in compliance with all applicable state and federal regulatory standards including the Uniform Building Code as adopted by the State of Illinois, the National Electrica Code as adopted by the State of Illinois, FAA requirements, EPA regulations (hazardous waste, construction, storm water; etc.) and any other statutory or regulatory requirements.
- b. Facility equipment shall conform to applicable industry standards including the American Wind Energy Association standards for wind turbine design and related standards adopted by the American Standards Institute (ANSI). Applicants shall submit certificates from equipment manufacturers that the equipment is manufactured in compliance with industry standards.

### **Permits Required**

- a. A WECS permit shall be obtained from the Zoning Administrator for the construction of all WECS.
- b. A building Permit shall be obtained to allow construction of WECS.

#### Rules and Setback Requirements of Private/Individual WECS Permits

- a. Turbines will be allowed in areas zoned as Agriculture, Residential, Rural Residential, General Business and Industrial.
- b. A maximum height at the top of blade tip of 150 feet.
- c. A setback of 1.1 times the height of the unit at the top of the blade tip. This applies to any property line.
- d. Tower and blade color shall be painted white or gray or another non-reflective, unobtrusive color.
- e. No more than two turbines on a five (5) acre tract of property will be permitted.



a. Any person, firm or corporation, or agent, employee or contractor of such, who violates, disobeys. omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with, or who resists enforcement of any provisior of this Ordinance shall be in violation, and shall be subject to a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each offense. Each week a violation continues to exist shall constitute a separate offense. The Shelby County Zoning Administrator shall be responsible for the administration and enforcement of the regulations of this Ordinance. The Shelby County State's Attorney shall prosecute violations of this Ordinance for the County.

#### Severability

b. If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

## **Liability Insurance, Indemnification, and Fees**

- a. Commencing with the issuance of a WECS Building Permit, the Applicant shall maintain a current general comprehensive liability policy and automobile liability coverage covering bodily injury, death and illness, and property damage with limits of at least Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000.00) per occurrence and Thirty Million Dollars (\$30,000,000) in the aggregate. Such insurance may be provided, pursuant to a plan of self-insurance, by a party with a net worth of Fifty Million Dollars (\$50,000,000.00) or more. The County and ts officers, appointed and elected officials, employees, attorneys, engineers and agents (the "County Affiliates") and all affected Road Districts and their officers, appointed and elected officials, employees, attorneys, engineers and agents (the "Road District Affiliates") shall be included additional insureds on the insurance certificate(s), endorsement(s) and policies for all aspects of the WECS Project for both ongoing and completed operations and for all automobiles owned, leased, hired or borrowed, as applicable, by the Applicant for the WECS Project. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to the County and the County Affiliates or the affected Road Districts and the Road Districts' Affiliates. The insurance coverage of the Applicant shall be primary and non-contributory for the additional insureds. The Applicant shall file the original certificate of insurance with the Zoning Administrator upon commencement of project construction prior to the issuance of a WECS Building Permit, corresponding policies and endorsements to be provided within sixty (60) days of issuance, and at each subsequent renewal, at least annually thereafter.
- b. The Applicant (WECS Permittee) shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the County and its officers, appointed and elected officials, employees, attorneys, engineers, and agents

(collectively and individually, the "Indemnified Parties") from and against any and all claims, demands, losses, suits, causes of action, damages, injuries, costs, expenses, and liabilities whatsoever, including reasonable attorney's fees, relating to or arising out of the special use permit application process and public hearing for the application, the issuance of the Special Use Permit, and the construction, operation, maintenance and removal of the WECS and affiliated equipment. This includes, without limitation, liability for property damage or personal injury (including death or illness), whether said liability is premised on contract, tort, or any violations of local, state, or federal law, including the Illinois Constitution and the United State Constitution (including without limitation strict liability or negligence) or any acts or omissions of the Applicant (WECS Permittee), the Owner or the Operator under this Ordinance or the Special Use Permit. This general indemnification shall not be construed as limiting or qualifying the County's other indemnification rights available under the law.

- c. Applicant, Owner, or Operators shall reimburse the County for any and all reasonable engineering fees incurred if the County, in its sole discretion, deems it necessary to hire an outside engineering consulting firm to work on any or all parts of the WECS Application Process and/or Project.
- d. Notwithstanding any other provision in this Zoning Code, the Chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals, in his sole discretion, is authorized to delegate to a third party (the "Presiding Officer") the Chairman's authority to preside over the public hearing on an application for a special use permit to site a WECS for the purpose of ensuring an orderly public hearing consistent with Illinois statutes and Constitution, Christian County ordinances, and the Articles of Rules and Procedure of the ZBA, and to rule on evidentiary and procedural disputes in the public hearing. The Presiding Officer must be an attorney in good standing with the Illinois bar. The Presiding Officer does not have any power to vote or deliberate on the pending application for special use permit, or to otherwise contribute to the Advisory Report of the Zoning Board of Appeals, such authority being expressly reserved to the ZBA. Applicant, Owner, or Operator shall pay the fees of the Presiding Officer and shall deposit a retainer with the Presiding Officer as a condition to the public hearing commencing, unless other terms are agreed upon in writing between the Presiding Officer and the Applicant, Owner, or Operator.

#### Remedies

- a. The Applicant's Owner's or Operator's failure to materially comply with any of the above provisions shall constitute a default under the Ordinance.
- b. Prior to implementation of the existing County procedures for the resolution of such default(s), the appropriate County body shall first provide written notice to the Owner and Operator, setting forth the alleged default(s). Such written notice shall provide the Owner

and Operator a time period, not to exceed 60 days, for good faith negotiations to resolve the alleged default(s).

c. If the County determines in its sole discretion, that the parties cannot resolve the alleged default(s) within the good faith negotiation period, the County shall have the right to rescind the permit for the WECS Project, take the actions allowed in the County Ordinance or take any other action permitted by law or in equity.

#### Waiver

Any waiver of a requirement in the Ordinance must be waived in writing by the property owner making such waiver and the waiver must be notarized and submitted by the Applicant of proof of its Application filed with the County Zoning Administrator.

### <u>Fees</u>

- a. Wind Energy Conversion System **(COMMERCIAL)** application for permit Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) DOLLARS
- b. Wind Energy Conversion System (PRIVATE/INDVIDUAL) application for permit Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) DOLLARS.

#### Fee Schedule

- a. Upon submittal of the Application for a wind energy conversion system special use, Applicant shall submit a certified check to Christian County in the amount of \$50,000. Should the actual costs to the County exceed \$50,000, the Applicant shall be responsible for those costs and shall remit additional funds within 15 days of the notice from the County. An amount remaining in the account after the County renders its decision and all bills and invoices have been paid, shall be refunded to the Applicant. Applicant shall file ten paper copies of the WECS special use application upon submittal of the WECS special use application fee. A minimum of one copy shall be filed in electronic format.
- b. Upon approval of a Special Use Permit by the County Board, a fee of Twenty-Seven Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$27.50) per vertical foot, (being the measurement from the base of the wind turbine to the hub), per turbine, shall be paid in connection with the submittal of the WECS Building Permit application(s) for a WECS Project(s) by the Applicant of the WECS Project(s). The Building Permit Fee for any major improvements to an existing WECS Tower, including the infrastructure for the tower support shall be Thirteen Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents (\$13.75) per vertical foot (being the measurement from the base of the wind turbine to the hub), per turbine

BE IT FINALLY ORDAINED, that the Board reserves the express right to change, modify or terminate these regulations and procedures at any time, in whole or in part, for any reason, with or without prior notice upon its own unilateral act.

This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon passage from the Shelby County Board.

The Shelby County Executive Committee met on Monday, October 4, 2021, at 8:00 A.M. at the Courthouse in Shelbyville, Illinois.

Chairman Bryon Coffman called the meeting to order. Those Executive committee members in attendance were Gary Gergeni, Mark Bennett, David Swits, and Gary Patterson. Robert Orman was absent. Fox also informed the committee next year they would need to begin levying funds again for Tort liability, worker's compensation, and unemployment as the restricted reserves for these levies would be spent down. Discussion was held.

Patterson made motion to increase the levies by 1.6% to capture new property construction which is allowable under PTELL. M. Bennett seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (5 yes, 0 no). (This would result in an approximate \$1,374 for the ambulance levy and \$77,037 to be split across the county tax levies).

The committee members will review the levy breakdowns and speak with SCCS, Health, Highway, and the Airport before making a recommendation to the full board on the tax levy breakdowns for approval. It is hoped the levy will be ready to present at the November 10, 2021, board meeting.

The next topic for discussion was the county board size for redistricting which must be completed by December 31, 2021. Discussion was held.

Patterson made motion to have the county divided into 17 county board districts with 1 member elected per district. Swits seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (5 yes, 0 no).

This item will be on the October 14, 2021, agenda for full board approval.

There was no public body comment.

Swits made motion to adjourn the meeting. M. Bennett seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (5 yes, 0 no).

The meeting was adjourned at 9:10 AM.

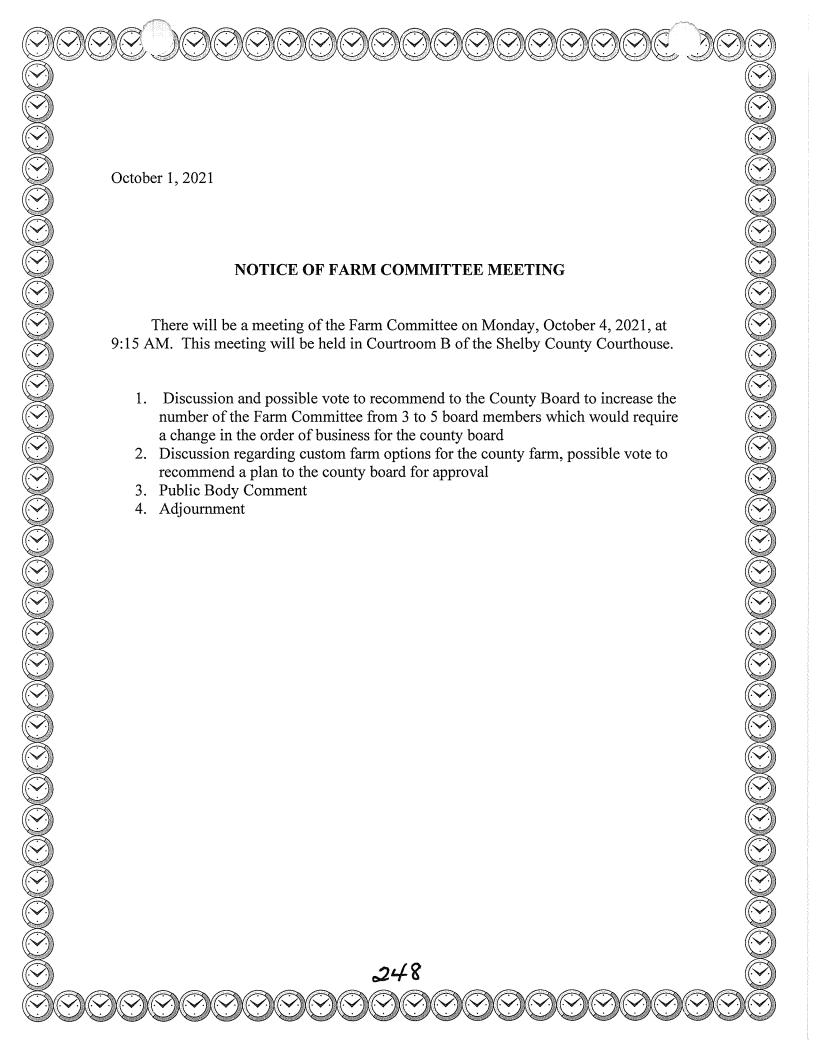
- 1. Approval of Minutes of September meeting-Jeff moved and Gary seconded. All in favor.

## SHELBY COUNTY AIRPORT and LANDING FIELD COMMISSION MINUTES OF MEETING September 13, 2021

Members present at meeting:

Commissioners--John Hall, Rick Brown, Jeff Green, Walt Lookofsky, Steve Wempen County Board Members--Paul Canaday, Dereck Pearcy Airport Manager-Scott Jefson Others Present--Jim Schwerman

Commissioner Rick Brown calls the meeting to order.

Jim Schwerman is present and Rick ask Jim to go ahead with his report.

Jim said the farm did real well this year. Wheat made 86 bushel an acre and that 5,116 bushel had been sold at an average price of \$6.11 and that there was still 500 bushel to sell. Jim said it was hard to say just yet on what the yields will turn out to be for corn and beans. Jim explains how the corn harvest will have an affect of the wheat prices. Jim mentions how some of the other farms that he manages are doing. Jim said he thinks we're going to have a record year for the soybean crop in this county and even though the corn crop has been ravaged by disease, it still going to be an excellent crop. Jim goes on the say the double crop soybeans look outstanding. and discussed the crop some. Jim mentions talking some to Scott and Paul about having Jim and Kevin mow the back along the drainage ditch and that they did get some mowed and could mow more after harvest, but might need to do some maintenance on the ditch first. Jim said after that big rain a few weeks ago, the drainage system just couldn't handle it and even had water backed up into the Main Hangar. Jim mentions having \$69,222 in the farm account and that figure will be going up, so if Steve needed any, that it was available. Scott said he assume this was the last day for cutting the hay crop and Jim said they finished that day and wouldn't

be cutting it again.

Jim passed out some financial reports and thanked the commission for letting him work for us and that if we had any questions to just give him a call. Scott got up and pointed at the grass area at the end of runway 32 and mentioned to Jim that we could stop mowing it and that he could start farming it to gain some more farm ground. Scott explained his thoughts some more and Jim said there would be no problem, just let him know and he would let Jim and Kevin know.

Jeff asks Scott about being able to plant up to the runway and Scott explains that they would do some measuring and stay back so far like they did at the thresholds of runway 4 and 36.

John mentions a low spot there and Scott says it mostly up by the gate, but if we ever decided the farm the front that there was 3-4 inches of water still standing there and that it hadn't rained for a few days, so some tiling or something would need to be done. Jim said that we could do that if there was no issues draining to the road ditch. Jim thanked the Commission and excused himself

The minutes were read by all. Walt made a motion to approve the minutes. It was seconded by John and was approved by all saying aye.

The Treasurer's report was read by all. Jeff made a motion to approve the Treasurer's Report. It was seconded by Walt and approved by all saying aye.

John ask Steve if he had received the invoices that he had sent him for the repairs on the batwing mower. Steve said he did and that he had gone back to August of 2018 and made copies of every check written for the mower repair.

### Managers Report

Scott starts off apologizing for missing the last meeting. Scott said he was stilling mowing, that the grass is still growing strong. Scott mentions the zero turn has gone thru a solenoid, a belt tensioner, and the blades needed replaced. The big mower went thru two more spindles. Scott said that Kevin Berson had been out twice and was coming back on September 23rd with a TV crew, all Balloon Fest related. Scott also said it was pretty well going to be the same as last year. The airport will pay for the Porta-Poties and the dumpster again. Scott mentions gearing up for the Balloon Fest but also had to deal with the water coming in the hangar a few weeks ago, that it was bubbling up out of both drains inside the hangar. Scott also said there was solid water between the office and Main Hangar and water bubbling out of the drains out by the Tee.

Scott continues saying the courtesy van has gone out a lot lately. Scott said one pilot was broke down and that the pilot drove the courtesy van to Staunton for parts and that he got his airplane fixed and he was able to fly home that evening. Scott also said a family flew in and took the courtesy van and went camping and drove back the next morning. They complemented our van and said they would be back. Scott said he was still working on the chain link fence, but some places are just shot.

Paul mentions there being a couple bald eagles here at the airport and Scott said the buzzards were thick after they cut the hay, but had finally started thinning out. Scott mentioned the Kill Deer birds were thick this year also.

Scott said that Galesburg has a big bi-wing fly in and that several bi-wing planes landed here for fuel and that they complemented us on our grass runways several times. Scott said that Tim Swiney ask him about renting the Main Hangar for a wedding. Scott mentions getting his airplane down here and that the repair would be one of his winter projects.

Scott said he and John had talked awhile ago but he started looking for a new big mower, that he was tired of rebuilding it. Some discussion ensued.

Scott mentions not hearing anything else on shutting down the ADS.

Scott ask about renting a backhoe to move some dirt from beside the SRE building to out front to fill in some low spots.

#### Old Business

Rick mentions an email about the cost of the new hangar project. Steve said because of the price increases in material the project that was around \$700,000 would now be around 1 to 1.2 million because of the big delay in getting the GATA paperwork taken care, so it will have to be rebid. The same reason the runway maintenance project went from \$277,000 to 299,000 and possibly more.

Jeff asks about the rules for renting out the empty T-Hangars for industrial storage. Jeff explained that IHI had a lot of plastic that they needed to store somewhere for awhile.

A lengthy discussion on the idea ensued.

Rick ask about not doing the hangar project, could we do a different project like the fence or reskinning the Main Hangar. Some discussion ensued on the matter. Steve mentions transferring the entitlement money to another airport and accumulate more so we wouldn't have to finance part of it for maybe a year or so while we waiting for more entitlement.

More discussion followed and on what projects that we want to do eventually.

John ask about where we stood with the county treasurer and taking care of the GATA forms that needed signed and submitted. Rick said that the States Attorney had been appointed the GATA Coordinator and that it was finally taken care of. More discussion ensued.

#### **New Business**

John mentions talking to someone about having an event, like a car show, here at the airport and that person said he did that and would love to have a meeting with us to get something scheduled. A lengthy discussion followed on the idea. It was decided to set up a meeting with him to discuss what all it would entail.

Rick makes a motion to rent tractor from Barker Equipment. Jeff second it and it was approved by all saying aye.

John made a motion to adjourn and Jeff second it.

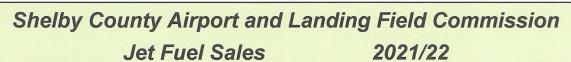
